L1 DMG Rickert PUD, PZC 17-1-009

Petitioners Diane Menza, Naperville, Greg Cresto, Spaceco Inc., Michael Vinci, Oak Park, and Keith Demchinski, Lisle, explained the proposal as a 21,040 square foot addition to the existing 26,500 square foot DuPage Medical Group facility located on the south lot at 808 Rickert Drive. In order to accommodate the required parking for the building expansion, the petitioner has purchased the property to the north at 2052 W. Ogden Avenue. The building located on the north lot will be demolished and the lots will be consolidated. Also included in the proposal is a rezoning of the north lot to OCI, a conditional use to establish a PUD on the north lot, a major change to the PUD and approval of a preliminary/final PUD plat with a deviation to allow parking in the major arterial setback and a deviation to allow a reduction in the permitted drive aisle width, and approval of a preliminary/final plat of subdivision.

Council discussed drive aisles, state and local roads, curb cuts, cell tower, the 50-year easement that was reset in July 2016, driver and pedestrian safety, and IDOT responsibilities.

Laff explained PUD standards, that the proposal has no negative impact on future plans for the area, and the permit process if the current cell tower is removed.

Novack stated the proposal presents no safety concerns.
