Bloomington	No
Berwyn	No
Carbondale	Yes. The application designation of landmarks may be made by the property owner, the CHPC, the Board of Trustees or an organization with a recognized interest in historic preservation., but when an application is submitted other than by the property owner, the Town Manager and at least one member of the CHPC shall contact the owner of the proposed landmark to advise them that an application has been filed and to secure the consent of the owner.

Chicago	No, but additional procedures are required when the owner does not consent. When requesting owner consent, if the owner declines or fails to give written consent to the proposed designation within the time specified, the Commission shall schedule a public hearing on the proposed designation.

Danville	No
Decatur	No
DeKalb	No, it may be requested by a site owner (or owners) or may be a decision of the DeKalb Landmark Commission or any organization or resident or the City of DeKalb. The property owners shall be notified.
Edwardsville	No, but applications may be initiated by any of the following: (1) An owner of record of the area, property, structure, site or object being nominated. (2) A member of the commission. (3) A simple majority of the council. (4) The mayor.
Evanston	No
Frankfort	No, but in the event that owner(s) consent is not provided a supermajority vote (75%) shall be required.
Glen Ellyn	Yes. If the owner of a proposed individual landmark or if 66⅔ percent of owners in a proposed landmark district fail(s) or refuse(s) to consent to the proposed designation within the applicable time periods, the designation process shall terminate as to that property without further action, and the subject of the proposed designation shall not be reconsidered for a period of two years.
Glenview	No
Highland Park	Yes. All nominations made by persons other than the owner of the applicable property, structure, area, object, or landscape of significance must be accompanied by written consent of the owner for the landmark designation prior to consideration by the Commission.
Hinsdale	Yes, applications for nominations for designation of a landmark or historic district may be submitted by the owner of record of the nominated landmark.

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Jacksonville	No
Lake Forest	No, but the landmark request may be initiated by the following: (a) An owner of record of the area, property, structure, site or object being nominated; (b) A member of the Commission; (c) A simple majority of the Council; or (d) A local, state or federal preservation organization.
Lemont	No, but owner consent of designation is desirable, per their Municipal Code.
Libertyville	No, but only the owner or Commission may submit a landmark application for a residential property. With respect to residential buildings, structures or sites, no application for a historic landmark designation may be considered by the commission unless the applicant is the owner or designated agent of the owner of such residential building, structure or site or the application is submitted on behalf of the commission.
Lincoln	No, but if any owner of the property being nominated is not the applicant, a public hearing may be called by the commission.
Lockport	Yes. A simple majority vote by the City Council is necessary for passage of an ordinance approving a landmark designation. However, the owner(s) of record must approve, in writing, the landmark or District Designation before the City Council approves a landmark designation.
Lombard	Yes, these designations shall be made only with the written approval of the property owners; however, written approval of the property owners shall not be required in the case of an "abandoned cemetery," as said term is defined in 65 ILCS 5/11-49-1(d), in the event that the owners of the abandoned cemetery are unknown, or no longer in existence.

Maywood	No
Monticello	No
Normal	No, but nominations for landmarks can only be made by the property owner of record of the nominated property or structure, the Historic Preservation Commission or the President and Board of Trustees.
O'Fallon	No
Orland Park	No
Oswego	No, but a supermajority vote is required from the HPC and Village Board to approve a landmark designation that does not have owner consent.
Park Ridge	Yes, owner consent is required.

Municipality	Is owner consent required?
	<p>Yes. The commission shall only consider for landmark designation properties whose owner or owners of record have responded to the application by submitting to the commission a letter of consent approving the designation of the property as a historic landmark. If such owner or owners do not consent to designation, the commission shall take no further action with respect to such property (and shall not recommend landmark designation to the city council). The commission shall only consider designation of a historic district if at least two-thirds of the owners of property in the area to be designated have responded to the application by submitting to the commission a letter of consent approving the designation of their property as part of a historic district. If two-thirds of the owners of record consent to the proposed designation of a historic district, the commission may proceed with designation.</p>

Rock Island	No
Rockford	<p>No, but the commission shall make all reasonable efforts to secure the written consent of the owner before proceeding with designation or removal. The commission shall notify the owner of record of any property for which an application is made (unless it is made by the owner) within three working days of receipt of such application.</p>
Springfield	<p>Yes. The commission shall only consider for landmark designation properties whose owner or owners of record have responded to the application by submitting to the commission a letter of consent approving the designation of the property as an historic landmark. If such owner or owners do not consent to designation, the commission shall take no further action with respect to such property (and shall not recommend landmark designation to the city council). The commission shall only consider designation of a historic district if the owner or 2/3 of the owners of property in the area to be designated have responded to the application by submitting to the commission a letter of consent approving the designation of their property as part of a historic district. If 2/3 of the owners of record consent to the proposed designation, the commission may proceed with designation.</p>
