Is that \$50K for ash trees specifically in these neighborhoods? Are ~ 1/3 of the trimming needs in these neighborhoods from ash trees?</b> | <b>Sullivan</b> |
| A:        | One third of the trimming completed under the contract will be ash trees. Ash trees are approximately 20% of the city's parkway tree population. While the percentage of ash trees varies by  | Dublinski       |

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|           | subdivision, the contract includes funding for deadwood and clearance trimming of trees that is outside the cycle trimming. This work is primarily done on ash trees and is intended to remove hazardous branches and to improve the health of the trees.  |               |
| <b>Q:</b> | <b>Does staff have a tally of how many Ash trees were saved from ash borers for the past few years? How many Ash trees does the city have on city property throughout the city?</b>  | <b>Gustin</b> |
| <b>A:</b> | Since the implementation of the EAB treatment program in 2012, more than 75% of the city's ash trees have survived.<br><br>There are approximately 12,400 ash trees on city parkways, with approximately 60 ash trees on city sites including the Municipal Center, Police Department, Fire Stations, and Electric and Water Department Sites. | Dublinski     |

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| <b>Q:</b> | <b>Confirming, the original contract for \$90K was to cover repairs between March 1, 2019 to Feb 2020 and we have used those funds in the first 7 months of the contract because of older truck repairs? This request is for an extra \$70K to cover us for the remaining 5 months on the contract. We jumped from an estimate of \$7500/mo. to an actual spend rate of over \$12K/month. What factors made our estimate/budget inadequate for this contract and what are we doing in the next year to getting better at anticipating the costs for 2020?</b> | <b>Sullivan</b> |
| <b>A:</b> | The original award was based on historical annual spend for Navistar units. As these units have increased in age, major components have started to fail, requiring higher costing repairs. The Navistar units have seen an unanticipated frequency of fuel injector failures when compared to other makes of equipment. Staff will analyze repair data to budget more accurately for the next contract year.  | Dublinski       |

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| <b>Q:</b> | <b>The memo states the current IT equipment has life expectancies of 3 years on tablets and others. How has IT evaluated the actual components and how is total replacement criteria is determined? Also, will there be a cost of programs or APs transfer from the old equipment to the new equipment? If so, how much?</b> | <b>Gustin</b> |
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| A: | <p>The Panasonic devices are for field workers and are on a 3 year replacement cycle to keep them under warranty. If a laptop is under warranty and a component fails, warranty repair will deliver and install the failed component next day as part of the 3 year warranty. If the laptop is not under warranty, it can take up to a week or more to purchase and receive the part from the manufacturer and then IT would have to replace the part, which can be difficult and time consuming on a laptop. IT wants to ensure that they are up running within 24 hours if there is a component failure, the best way to ensure this is to keep the laptops under warranty.</p> <p>IT utilizes Microsoft System Center Configuration Manager (SCCM) to automate the installation of the Microsoft operating system, Windows 10, and the enterprise and departmental applications. There are certain applications that must be installed manually but all work is completed by IT.</p> | Urbas |
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| <b>Q:</b> | <b>If my math is correct, I come up with these units costing \$5,800? Is that correct or is there more to this purchase?</b>   | <b>Hinterlong</b> |
| A:        | There are a total of 55 units being purchased which range from \$3,100 to \$3,800 each depending on configurations. Also included in the purchase are the docking stations and power supplies. | Mayer             |

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| <b>Q:</b> | <b>Please provide equipment replacement by Department, old equipment and its new recommended replacement. Will there be any program changes, and if so, any necessary updated training? Will there be a sale of the old equipment to offset some cost? Or will the old equipment be donated after scrubbed?</b>  | <b>Gustin</b>   |
| A:        | <p>See attached spreadsheet for the requested list of departments with the current equipment and recommended replacements. This is a hardware only replacement so no additional training will be necessary. IT removes the hard drives from the systems before surplusing. The hard drives are removed and crushed to ensure that no city data is compromised. The PCs are then surplused and we sell them on GovDeals.</p> <p>Whenever City property, supplies and equipment have been determined to no longer be of use to a department, the Procurement Team will first check to see if the surplus item(s) can be of use to another City department. If not, the item(s) will be sold or disposed of depending upon the condition and value of the item(s). Traditionally, old computer stock is auctioned on the GovDeals, an online e-bidding service similar to e-Bay but specific to governments. The amount the City receives depends upon the age, condition and desirability of the item(s). The Procurement Code allows for items to be donated. If there is a request to donate item(s) rather than sell them, staff will present a recommendation to the City Council for their consideration.</p> | Urbas/<br>Mayer |

When will they be in working order?</b>  | <b>Sullivan</b>  |
| <b>A:</b> | <p>On September 4, Unit 322 went to Fleet Services due to a front-end noise caused by a suspension issue. Welding was completed to make the unit roadworthy. Parts to complete the cab bushing repair came in two weeks later, and the unit went back in for the repair on September 23. The invoice for this work has not been received. Following this repair, Unit 322 went to another vendor for engine repairs costing \$2,600 It is anticipated that this unit will be back in service this week.</p> <p>On September 12, Unit 328 went to Fleet Services for a stop engine light fault code. It was diagnosed to be an electrical connection issue. In addition, a brake pedal was sticking and fixed. An oil leak was identified and the source was determined to be the outrigger cylinder, placing the unit out of service. The outrigger cylinder was removed and repaired. That unit is now back in service. Cost of this repair was approximately \$5,000.</p> | <b>Dublinski</b> |

What are the pros and cons of doing nothing?</b><br/> <b>B. Naperville is far larger than other IMUA members and also not in close proximity to any of the smaller partners. What sort of specific help/resources might we need and/or offer in this agreement (e.g. City staff, equipment, knowledge, etc.)?</b><br/> <b>C. Who/how will the City is responsible to make the decision about whether to help a mutual aid partner and the scope of aid?</b><br/> <b>D. | <p><b>A:</b></p> | <p>A. The city has in-house labor, equipment, and material in place to deal with emergency situations. The city also has a contract in place with a local electric utility contractor. The upside to having this agreement in place is that if something significant does happen to the entire area and our contractor cannot respond to assist, the city has to make one call to IMUA and they will coordinate skilled resources for us from areas not impacted. Staff does not see a downside to this agreement as it is 100% voluntary.</p> <p>B. In these type of agreements the city would most likely be requesting and receiving request for labor and equipment. This is skilled labor such as certified Electrical Line Workers and specialized equipment such as bucket trucks, cable pullers, and pole hole diggers.</p> <p>C. The City Manager, with the input of the Electric Utility Director, would make the call as to whether or not the city would participate in an event.</p> <p>D. There is no predetermined cost to this agreement. At the time of an event a cost benefit analysis would have to be done.</p> <p>E. 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| <p><b>Q:</b></p> | <p><b>I thought Naperville residents have free ambulance service? How does this apply?</b></p>                                     | <p><b>Hinterlong</b></p> |
| <p><b>A:</b></p> | <p>This has no impact on our residents. Nothing will change in the way residents are billed or invoiced for ambulance service.</p> | <p>Giannattasio</p>      |

Medicaid and managed care patients are billed through Medicaid and the department is reimbursed through Medicaid. The only change is in the reimbursement amount from Medicaid. It will now reflect more accurately the true cost of the transport and care rendered. This In no way changes the amount billed for transport, the city ordinance on emergency medical care or the way transport or care is rendered.

Please explain the difference in code between a 'temporary' parking lot versus a permanent one and any implications in terms of taxing or maintenance. This 'temporary' parking lot has existed for 13 years and this ordinance would end when it is 18 years old.</b></p> <p><b>B. Does this ordinance allow for the City to cancel this extension before 12/2024 with written notice? If not, can we consider a shorter term, or alternatively making this a permanent parking lot?</b></p>  | <p>Sullivan</p> |
| <p>A.</p>        | <p>A. Parking lots, as a principal use, are not permitted within the TU zoning district. Therefore, a temporary use is required to permit the interim use of the subject property as a parking lot. In order to allow this parking lot to permanently remain on the subject property, the TU zoning district would need to be amended to add "parking lots" as a permitted use; this amendment would not be recommended as it would then permit this use on all TU zoned properties.</p> <p>Staff has contacted Naperville Township regarding the taxing implications; however, their offices were closed on Monday, October 14th due to Columbus Day. Staff will provide this information when it is received. The petitioner has provided a tax bill for the property (attached).</p> <p>There are no maintenance implications resulting from this parking lot being temporary vs. permanent.</p> <p>In the staff report, the temporary use is noted as having been approved since 2007. For clarification, the temporary use approved in 2007 and extended in 2008, 2009 and 2011 was for a temporary gravel parking lot located at the southeast corner of Webster and Water Streets (current location of Quibo). 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| <p><b>Q:</b></p> | <p><b>The question seems unnecessarily wordy, shorter is better in my view. Do we need to reference the legislation? Can we just ask "Should the City of Naperville allow the retail sale of recreational marijuana?"</b></p>  | <p>Coyne</p>   |
| <p><b>A:</b></p> | <p>Referencing the legislation is not necessary. The intent of the additional, contextual language is, in part, is to: (1) distinguish between medical and adult use; (2) acknowledge that the question is in response to state (not local) action to legalize adult use cannabis; and (3) acknowledge local action is limited to business activity, not possession and use.</p> <p>It is within Council's authority to move to amend the language of the resolution referendum question and if a Council majority passes said motion, the change will be effective. It is recommended that the referenda question begin with the word "shall" rather than "should" in order to strictly apply with state statute.</p> | <p>DiSanto</p> |

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| <p><b>Q:</b></p> | <p><b>A. Given the way the CRTA is written and administered in the State of Illinois and from what we know about licensing and taxing schedules relating to adult use recreational cannabis sales, how would the City of Naperville's ability to attract licensed retailers and optimize tax collection opportunities differ if City Council were to opt-in in April 2020 versus an opt-in decision in December 2020? Please answer this question in terms of the availability of licenses and the timing of the city's ability to collect taxes that would come directly back to Naperville, and any other relevant factors that would differ in each case.</b></p> <p><b>B. 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**C. Can you confirm that a voter's access to vote on this referendum question will be exactly the same in the primary election March 2020 as it will be to a general election in November 2020? In other words, are there ANY impediments that would keep an interested Naperville voter from easily voting on this referendum in March 2020 versus November 2020?**

**D. Should a vote on a referendum date not garner enough votes in City Council, when is the earliest the Council could request staff to bring an Opt-In ordinance back for a vote?**

A:

A. The impact of opting-out on the City's ability to attract adult use cannabis businesses in the future if the City decides to opt-in is unclear.

DiSanto

The state will issue licenses according to a graduated scale. The Act allows the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation (IDFPR) to award up to two "early approval" adult-use licenses to each existing medical dispensary, effective January 1, 2020. Therefore, as there are approximately 55 existing medical dispensaries, there are a maximum of approximately 110 early approval adult use licenses for dispensing organizations initially available as of January 1, 2020.

Then, as part of what is being called "Wave 1", the IDFPR may award up to 75 additional licenses to new dispensing organizations, Then, as part of what is being called "Wave 2", the IDFPR may award up to 110 additional licenses to new dispensing organizations. In total, it appears the State has allocated a total of approximately 295 state-wide licenses for dispensing organizations through 2021. There are less, but similar licenses allocated for cultivators, growers, infusers, and transporting organizations that may be issued by the Illinois Department of Agriculture.

Staff expects that the medical cannabis dispensaries will quickly establish their eligible second adult use locations in jurisdictions that opt-in to maximize the competitive advantage afforded those existing medical dispensaries. By having opted-out, Naperville may miss out on those experienced dispensary operators locating in Naperville if the City later opts-in. However, Staff also expects that there will be dispensaries interested in locating in Naperville if the City chooses to opt-in in the future, but such expectations are speculative.

Local governments that permit the local retail sale of adult use cannabis can impose a local tax of up to 3%. That tax will be collected by the Illinois Department of Revenue (IDOR) and remitted to the local government that imposed the tax. An ordinance imposing this tax must be filed with the IDOR on or before the first day of June, whereupon the IDOR shall proceed to administer and enforce this section as of the first day of September next following the adoption and filing.

That regulation has been generally interpreted in the Illinois municipal legal community to mean that any tax ordinance passed before June 1, 2020 will be administered and enforced by the



IDOR effective September 1, 2020. If the June 1, 2020 deadline is missed the next available date to begin taxing adult use cannabis will be September 1, 2021, for any tax passed after June 1, 2020, but before June 1, 2021.

It must be noted that this one-time per year opportunity to impose a tax is unusual and the Illinois Municipal League is working to clarify this issue by asking the General Assembly to address it via a trailer bill during the current veto session.

B. Yes. Under the state law, local government entities may regulate the presence of local adult use cannabis businesses, including prohibiting them. The City of Naperville has passed an ordinance prohibiting all local adult use cannabis businesses. That prohibition will remain unless and until the City Council acts to modify said regulation.

C. Staff has consulted the DuPage County and Will County Election Boards and staff is unaware of any impediments that will inhibit voters from voting on any proposed referenda question whether it appears on the March 2020 or November 2020 election ballot.

D. Council voted to opt-out at its September 3, 2019 City Council meeting. That determination made by the City Council may not be reconsidered or considered again within 62 days of the City Council's decision. So, the September 3 decision may not be considered again until after November 5, 2019, meaning November 19, 2019 is the first regularly scheduled City Council meeting when Council may again consider the opt-out determination.

How many Naperville voters voted in the past two March/April primaries, November general elections and City of</b></p> | <p><b>Gustin</b></p> |
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|    | <b>Naperville municipal elections?</b>   |                       |
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| A: | <p>A. Per the results of the Decennial Census, the Voting Rights Act, 42 U.S.C.A. § 1973aa-1a, Section 203 now applies to municipalities in DuPage County. As such, questions put forth by municipalities are required to be printed in different languages. Naperville must print the referendum question in Spanish. The cost of translation services is anticipated to be less than \$50. Staff is unaware of any other significant costs relative to administering a referendum question as part of a regularly scheduled election.</p> <p>B. Re: using the term "marijuana" rather than "cannabis", staff chose to use their term cannabis because that is the term used in the state law, elsewhere in the state code, in the City's opt-out ordinance, and elsewhere in the city code. Also, cannabis is the actual scientific genus name of the psychoactive plants. Marijuana is a colloquial term of some disputed origin and applicability, although notably Colorado uses the term marijuana while California uses the term cannabis. It is within Council's authority to move to amend the language of the resolution referendum question from cannabis to marijuana and if a Council majority passes said motion the change will be effective.</p> <p>C. State law refers to "recreational" cannabis as "adult use" and "adult use" is differentiated from "medical" cannabis. Notably, in special circumstances minors may be able to use medical cannabis, other than that use, there is no other non-adult use of cannabis authorized under state law. The proposed referendum question is focused only on recreational adult-use cannabis. It is within Council's authority to move to amend the language of the resolution referendum question and if a Council majority passes said motion, the change will be effective.</p> <p>D. Example of staff's proposed referenda question, posed re: prohibiting rather than allowing recreational sales: "Shall the City of Naperville, in light of state legislation legalizing the possession, consumption, and sale of recreational adult use cannabis, prohibit the sale of recreational adult use cannabis within its jurisdiction?"</p> <p>E. Staff does not yet have community impact cost estimates re: adult use cannabis legalization. Staff expects the City will incur most of any said costs regardless of whether local cannabis businesses are allowed because most of said costs will be related to use and possession education and enforcement efforts.</p> <p>F. 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| Q: | <p><b>A. How many SCBAs will this contract buy and what is the average useful life for these?</b></p> <p><b>B. How does staff recommend the City fund this request? Debt, cash or other?</b></p> <p><b>C. The legislation text suggests that none of the 150 current air packs will be compliant for front-line use starting 10/2019. What are the consequences for the City and for the fire personnel if we do not approve this CIP?</b></p>  | Sullivan            |
| A: | <p>A. This will purchase 150 air packs, 200 face pieces, and 280 cylinders. The expected life of the air packs is 12-15 years before upgrades are needed. These packs have a lifetime warranty and will be repaired at no cost, which extends the life for decades. The cylinders have an expected life of 15 years and are not covered under the lifetime warranty. The face pieces could last 1-10 years based on wear and tear by the user. Depending on wear and tear by the user, face pieces could last up to 10 years.</p> <p>B. As part of the 2020 budget staff is recommending that this project will be funded through debt issuance.</p> <p>C. If this CIP was not approved, Fire Department personnel would continue to utilize SCBA equipment that has been maintained but does not comply with the most current NFPA standards. The City strives to have up-to-date safety equipment to eliminate or reduce the likelihood of work related injuries related to SCBA equipment.</p> | Salela/<br>Hallgren |

are asking what the city's commitment level will be before moving forward. Currently, we have a match challenge of roughly \$500k from one of these types of institutions and it too is asking what is the city's "skin in the game."

**USING SECA:**

At the suggestion of staff and others, NHS put forth an ask to SECA previously which was dismissed as not appropriate by the then council liaison to SECA.

NHS would support the use of SECA for such projects particularly because the capital projects would involve and include ALL Naperville residents, and because both would have a lasting impact with a modest contribution of 1/3.

City staff would recommend SECA as a funding source, should the City Council want to fund either a portion or all of either project. Due to the size, debt could be issued and then the related debt service funded over several years from SECA dollars. (Krieger)

#### FUNDING:

Naper Settlement has been stewarding philanthropists and donors for several years, and has several potential donors seriously engaged, including a philanthropist with a \$.5M challenge. The Tellabs Foundation and Birck Family Foundation have contributed approximately \$1.1M alone. Names or lists of others with whom we are conversing cannot be provided as best practices requires that conversations remain confidential until all aspects of the gift/donation are finalized. Additionally, a large fundraising event held to benefit the Ag Center also raised several hundred thousand dollars. Approximately \$300K is included in the state's capital bill. Hopefully, the examples above are enough to demonstrate NHS's commitment and potential.

**Naper Settlement is the institutional memory of our city. We will lose powerful stories and lessons like this one if we have no place for them.**

**Naperville has powerful ties to the national narrative of 20<sup>th</sup> & 21<sup>st</sup> century America.** These are not just the story of this city, but of a nation. Our current and future generations must know about our struggles and the people that championed such important causes like Civil Rights for all Americans.

#### B: WHICH PROJECT TO CHOSE

Trying to choose between projects is a little like asking which child do you want to keep if you can only keep one. Together, they are the story of the 20<sup>th</sup> & 21<sup>st</sup> century. Perhaps it is better to consider thinking about them in terms of timing. As a matter of policy, the Naperville Heritage Society (NHS) does not begin construction until at least 90+% of the funding is committed or in hand. As a result, it is not expected that a shovel will be put in the ground until sometime in 2022. NHS would begin construction on whichever project is funded first. Given the events, field trips and other rentals that happen throughout the year construction would be planned so that it would be the least disruptive to those other sources of revenue.

The goal is to secure a commitment and plan to provide funding in the next 2.5 to 5 years for both projects. With the commitment from the City, NHS can reach out to donors differently. With the city's commitment NHS would near or surpass the 50% of the funding goal by next spring, which is key for attracting other donors.

**C: SOURCES OF ADDITIONAL REVENUE**

\* The fundraising plan developed includes an endowment to cover expenses for each building down the road.

\* Cultural tourism brings approximately \$2.7 billion to DuPage County alone according to the Illinois Department of Tourism. State-wide it surpasses \$35 billion. Naper Settlement is among the state's top 25 tourist destination and ranks even higher in DuPage County. These projects will allow the city, an already known destination city, to capture a significant share of that market. Culture amenities have proven to be magnets for travelers and their money. Local businesses can participate because travelers extend the length of their trips to attend cultural events. According to the National Statistical Report of the Economic Impact of Nonprofit Arts and Culture culture-based travelers 1) spend more than other travelers, 2) are more likely to stay overnight, 3) are more likely to spend \$1,000 or more during a stay, and 4) travel longer than other travelers. Our state statistical analysis shows similar results in spending behavior. The potential to bring more and new revenue for the city is great in opportunity and dollars.

**AN ORDINANCE GRANTING AN EXTENSION TO THE  
TEMPORARY USE TO ALLOW FOR THE CONTINUED USE OF A  
TEMPORARY PARKING LOT AT 141 AURORA AVENUE**

**WHEREAS**, Water Street Property Owner, LLC, 401 South Main Street, Suite 300, Naperville, Illinois ("Petitioner"), has petitioned the City of Naperville for approval of an extension to the temporary use to allow for the continued use of a temporary paved parking lot on the property located at 141 Aurora Avenue, Naperville, Illinois ("Subject Property"), legally described on Exhibit A, through December 31, 2024; and

**WHEREAS**, the Subject Property is currently zoned TU (Transitional Use); and

**WHEREAS**, per Section 6-71-2 (TU: Permitted Uses), the improvement of the Subject Property with a parking lot as the principal use is not permitted within the TU District; and

**WHEREAS**, the Petitioner has indicated that the proposed parking lot will provide for valet parking; and

**WHEREAS**, the Petitioner is requesting approval of an extension to the existing temporary use pursuant to Section 6-2-11 of the Naperville Municipal Code to allow the

temporary paved parking lot to continue to be used on the Subject Property through December 31, 2024; and

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to Section 6-2-11, temporary uses which exceed a six-month period shall require City Council approval; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council has determined that the temporary use should be granted; however, has amended the length of time for which the temporary use should be approved to December 31, 2024.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NAPERVILLE, DUPAGE AND WILL COUNTIES, ILLINOIS, in exercise of its home rule powers, as follows:**

**SECTION 1:** The foregoing recitals are incorporated as though fully set forth here. All exhibits referenced in this Ordinance shall be deemed incorporated and made part hereof.

**SECTION 2:** A temporary use to allow for the continued use of the temporary parking lot on the Subject Property, as described on **Exhibit A** and depicted on **Exhibit B**, is hereby granted through December 31, 2024.

**SECTION 3:** This Ordinance is subject to all conditions and requirements set forth in the Naperville Municipal Code, as amended from time to time.

**SECTION 4:** The City Clerk is authorized and direct to record this Ordinance with the DuPage County Recorder.

**SECTION 5:** This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon its passage and approval.

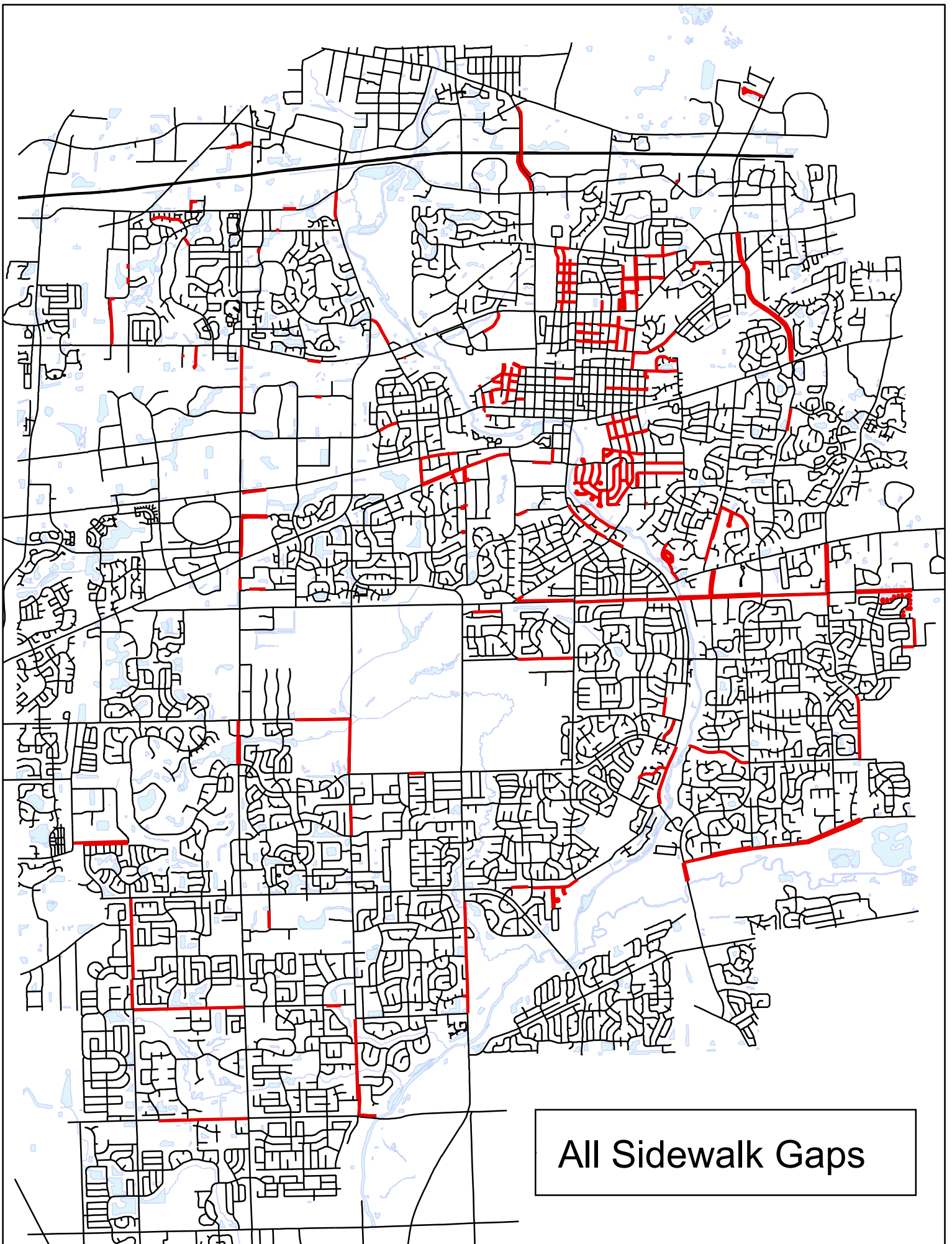
