Q:	SSA 26 - Description is downtown maintenance and MARKETING how does this overlap with the Naperville Development Partner budget and services? What portion of this budget is used on marketing? Are DT business owners comfortable with this increase? Has a business survey Been completed? Some business owners complain of DT lack of affordability due to expenses. A:	The items covered through SSA #26 for Downtown Maintenance and Marketing do not have any direct overlap with the Naperville Development Partnership (NDP). Marketing funds collected through the SSA (100% paid by property owners) are provided directly to the Downtown Naperville Alliance (DNA) for marketing services. However, the DNA and NDP do coordinate activities for joint marketing opportunities such as the Naperville dining directory and other areas where marketing efforts overlap. Of the \$375,500 for this levy request, 70% is utilized for direct marketing which consists of marketing the downtown through print, radio, direct mail, internet, and social media to expand the downtown customer base. The DNA also provides administration of the gift card program, training, and merchant meetings along with other services that promote business expansion and retention. The request for a 2% increase in the marketing is to keep	Hallgren, Erik

> regional marketing efforts competitive and is in line with projections provided during the SSA renewal process in 2015.

The SSA was re-established in 2015. As part of the renewal process, business owners were notified in June of 2015 with notice for a public hearing to be held in August of 2015. All property owners were notified by mail of the public hearing and given an opportunity to object, no objections were received. Additionally, City staff met with members of the DNA as well as property owners to discuss expenditures, revenues, assessed valuations, and marketing of the downtown. The DNA in conjunction with Staff held two open houses for property owners and business owners. While a survey has not been conducted, there is ongoing communication between the DNA, the City, and businesses through merchant meetings and other outreach efforts. The City continually reviews expenditures on an annual basis through the budget process and has maintained expenditure levels around the projections utilized during the SSA renewal process. Additionally, as part of the SSA there is a maximum 2.5% tax rate, the projection for CY18 is around 1.65%.

Q:	Please confirm 27w438 Knoch Knolls will not be approved for a sidewalk? What amount of money/cost savings will be recognized? Also, please provide an update of the Burlington Fund account as of to date? Current balance please.  Thank you.	Gustin, Patty
<b>A</b> :	Sidewalk along Knoch Knolls Road from Mayfield Court to Seiler Drive, which includes 27W438 Knoch Knolls Road, is included as one of the eight locations recommended for installation as part of the 2018 Annual New Sidewalk Program. The eight locations were approved by the Transportation Advisory Board (TAB) during their September 7, 2017 meeting. During and following the TAB meeting, the homeowner of 27W438 Knoch Knolls Road submitted correspondence with concerns about the installation of sidewalk along his property. Staff has since met with the homeowner and addressed his concerns regarding sidewalk installation at this location. Sidewalk in this location is projected to cost \$28,000. Because portions of this segment are adjacent to unincorporated parcels, staff contacted Wheatland Township about a cost share and they may be willing to participate. > At the end of 2016 (last audited figures), the City had \$6,529,275 as a balance to end the year. In 2017 (through 9-months), the City has earned \$1,617,451 in revenues and expended \$4,394,544, leaving a current balance (unaudited) of \$3,752,182. There was a significant expenditure of \$3,405,508 in March of 2017 for the Boecker Property.

Q:	Regarding sidewalk near 27W438 Knoch Knolls Road: I do not know that area, nor do I know what warrants new sidewalks. Given the tight budget for 2018 is this an area that could be delayed?	Boyd- Obarski, Rebecca
A:	This is a great question to ask, especially during budget season. We look at the new sidewalk program as a whole, not by the locations. During the City's initial lean years from 2008 through 2010 the City Council had discussions about completely discontinuing the program. We strongly recommended against it, instead suggesting that we reduce the cost of the program from \$300,000 annually to \$100,000. The City Council did keep it in the program at a reduced cost for several years, and then we raised it back to the previous \$300,000.	Novack, Bill
	This location is actually good for us from a budget perspective since it includes both incorporated and unincorporated properties. We have a great history of cost sharing on these improvements with Wheatland Township. They have paid for their share of sidewalk across unincorporated properties at many locations over the years. One other location that is included in next year's program is the east side of Book Road between Douglas and Leverenz Roads. Wheatland Township has agreed to pay for this section, and we have had preliminary discussions with them about these two lots. We plan to bring an Intergovernmental Agreement for your approval toward the end of the year that will detail the cost sharing. When we have these cost sharing arrangements we get more sidewalk for less cost to the City, so it is a good deal for us and for the incorporated and unincorporated residents as well.	
	At this time I would concentrate on if you support the eight locations we are recommending. As we go through the CY2018 budget process, if City Council determines that this program should be deferred or reduced, we can always come back with a revised list for your approval before the construction season.

### Naperville Springbrook Site Summary


The area under consideration is needed to provide capacity relief to the neighboring cell sites.
