DiSanto, This is a complex question that is dependent on the circumstances of the Mike fall. In general, liability may fall upon anyone whose negligence contributed to an injury. That liability may fall upon the owner/operator of the pedal pub, the person who fell, a third party that causes or contributes to the fall, etc. It is highly unlikely that the City would be exposed to any significant liability related to a fall unless an agent of the City caused or contributed to the fall or unless the fall was caused or contributed to by some defect in the City roadway sufficient to overcome the City's tort immunity. At any point will the peddle pub receive a BYOB approval? Currently there is not a liquor license in the City's code that would allow the sale or consumption of alcohol on a commercial quadricycle. It would require Council action to allow the sale or consumption of alcohol on a commercial quadricycle. Recently, the Naperville Liquor Commission recommended not allowing the sale or consumption of liquor on commercial quadricycles. Some of the roads approved for this use are subdivision collectors that pickup and drop off kids from the school bus, limiting street clearance will there be a time use restriction? Staff believes it is highly unlikely that commercial quadricycles will operate at the same time or location as school buses. - Staff is unaware of any non-commercial quadricycles. Staff chose to define "pedal pubs" as "commercial quadricycles" for several reasons. It is important to consider that these "pedal pub" regulations are new and have not been tested by the courts. Therefore, it is recommended that the regulation be narrowly tailored to a legitimate government interest and be the least restrictive method needed to address said interest. At this time, the Council's primary concern is the commercial use of "pedal pubs" in the Downtown and arterial roadways based upon the bona fide interest commercial companies have expressed in operating Downtown. Council likely has broader authority to regulate local businesses than it does to regulate vehicles on the public roadway as that is a power generally exercised by the State through the Illinois Vehicle Code. Therefore, it is recommended that Council tailor its regulation to address the present issue of businesses operating these quadricycles. The proposed definition of commercial quadricycles is consistent with regulations that have been passed in other states, Michigan and Wisconsin, in particular. If non-commercial quadricycles become an issue in the City, Council may request or staff may bring this ordinance back to Council with recommended changes to address that issue.
- c. In order to meet the definition of commercial quadricycle in the ordinance the vehicle must be "used for a commercial purpose." Generally, "used for a commercial purpose" is intended and may reasonably interpreted to mean the carriage of persons or property for any fare, fee, rate, charge or other consideration, or directly or indirectly in connection with any business, or other undertaking. As such, not-forprofit use would be considered for a commercial purpose if any fare, fee, rate, charge or other consideration was connected with the use of the commercial quadricycle. It is unlikely that recreational use would fall under that definition and thus, pure recreational use would not be subject to the Downtown/Arterials prohibition (see answer above for more detail why regulating the commercial use versus the roadway use is recommended). Nevertheless, if Council so chooses it may strike the "commercial purpose" requirement from the definition and change the regulation to focus on all "quadricycles" rather than just "commercial" ones, however, staff believes that said change would make the ordinance more vulnerable to a challenge.

A:	Although it is true that DPW has people and equipment to trim and cut down trees, this type of work near power lines and in the side and rear yards is very dangerous and requires other equipment and training to be cost efficient. Having the Forestry Department take on this type of work would take a learning curve and would put the City at a higher risk for injury and damage. Q:	What other expenses or projects are ComEd credits used on? How	Gustin,

better provide guidance on how best to be most effective and cost conscious in this area. Has staff worked on or considered such an option for this area?

A: ComEd Credits: The ComEd credits have to be used to underground existing overhead ComEd lines. The credits accumulated at a rate of 0.4% of the revenues collected by ComEd for power supply service provided to the City from July 1, 1994, through May 31, 2007, when the City's contract with ComEd expired. The City is proposing to apply its approximately \$1.5 million in remaining ComEd credits to underground ComEd overhead lines on Ogden Avenue.

Report: Houseal Lavigne Associates completed the "Ogden Avenue Corridor Enhancement Initiative" in 2008. In addition to providing recommendations regarding land use, corridor beautification, and implementation, a market analysis was completed with this plan. Since that time, NDP and City staff continue to analyze the market along the Ogden Avenue Corridor using CoStar and ESRI demographic/market data; however, tenanting and redevelopment options are largely dependent on the underlying property owner. Finally, staff hired Hitchcock Design Group to provide design recommendations for the Ogden Avenue Streetscape, which were presented at a public open house, along with implementation and funding options. Based on the response received, staff has prepared an alternative design and implementation option as noted in the current report. Beyond the above efforts, staff has not worked on additional reporting efforts internally; funds have not been budgeted to date to hire a consultant to provide an overall comprehensive report as noted above (which may range in cost from \$60,000 - \$100,000+).

Q: 1. With respect to existing pole signs on Ogden, I am aware there is an ordinance in place that requires the pole signs to come down as buildings change hands. That ordinance is many years old now, yet numerous pole signs are in place. Could we amend this ordinance to require them all to be down by a certain date? The pole signs are not attractive and some could foreseeable be up decades if they don't have to come down until the property is sold.

I have received multiple calls from residents and one business owner complaining about the individuals camping near Ogden. One being the Huber camp and the other being another homeless woman camped near the 5th third bank near Naper and Ogden. I've been told by staff that both camps (which are growing in size) are on unincorporated property so I've directed these inquiries to the County. County staff disagrees with our staff assessment and has been directing these inquiries back to the City. It's been aggravating for the residents concerned. I think we need our staff to talk to county staff to pin down what the correct answer is so inconsistent information is not being given to residents. I would also like to confirm that in both cases social services agencies have been directed to the camp sites and in both cases the individuals have declined assistance and refuse to leave...l.e. have free Housing alternatives in fact been presented to these individuals?

- A: Pole signs are prohibited per the Sign Code. Many that remain along Ogden Avenue are classified as "non-conforming" and are subject to the following (note: some pole signs were allowed through the variance process; those signs are considered legal and are not subject to the section below):
 - Ordinary repairs and maintenance, including removing and replacing of the outer tenant panels shall be permitted (except in those cases when the revision of the display of commercial speech is due to a change of the business tenant). No structural alterations, or other similar work shall appreciably extend the normal life of the sign.
 - No repair, alteration, or replacement which increases the size of the sign shall be permitted.
 - A nonconforming sign which is destroyed or damaged by fire to the
 extent that the cost of restoration to the condition in which it was before
 the occurrence shall exceed fifty percent (50%) of the cost of the
 replacement of the entire sign, shall not be restored unless said sign

shall conform to all of the regulations of this Chapter and other applicable regulations of the City of Naperville.

 If a nonconforming sign is discontinued for a continuous period of one hundred eighty (180) days, it shall be removed, and any subsequent sign shall conform to all of the requirements of this Chapter and other applicable regulations of the City of Naperville.

The current ordinance language could be amended to establish an amortization period by which all non-conforming pole signs must be removed. Said amendment will require a public hearing before the Planning and Zoning Commission with final approval by City Council; per code, all impacted property owners would be notified of the pending change. Staff did consider recommending the establishment of an incentive program to encourage the replacement of non-conforming pole signs with legal monument signs; however, there are no funds available within the current budget to support this effort and, given the volume of signs, this incentive program could require significant funding levels.

Staff is continuing to investigate the two camp locations referenced above and will coordinate with DuPage County regarding the responsible agency, any potential violations, and any resulting enforcement actions; staff will provide further information to the City Council once it is available. Staff can confirm that both individuals have been informed of social service agencies and their offerings; both individuals acknowledged their offerings and elected not to pursue them.

Q:	 a. Street signs – what is the cost of just replacing the Ogden Ave street signs with new Green Signs (standard issue)? Many of the current signs are in very poor shape, letters rubbed off and green background peeling. b. Transformer Boxes – were covers for the transformer boxes considered? A:	 a. Street signs: there is no increase in price from the standard green street signs to the proposed blue street signs. Therefore, either option would cost approximately \$40,000. b. Transformer Boxes: The initial consideration for not using covers on transformer boxes is due to pricing. A wrap has a maximum life expectancy of 5 years at a cost of approximately \$1000 while painting has a life expectancy of 25-30 years at a cost of \$1,500. c. Signage: At this time, staff does not have pricing information for the alternative sign structures. However, staff has reached out to an Ogden Avenue property owner who is currently bidding this work for his property to learn more. d. Cost-Share: Yes, if the City Council allocates funding, a program could be established to incentivize property owners to replace their existing monument signage with the proposed Ogden Avenue design. A:	The City retained Hitchcock Design Group in 2017 to develop the original streetscape design proposals for a cost of \$7,500. The NDP has worked with Kevin Peterson Associates to develop the revised signage proposal; to date, NDP has not paid a fee for this work. Staff has not budgeted any additional funds for work along Ogden Avenue; the work proposed in the agenda item would either be accounted for through existing CIP programs (i.e., transformer maintenance is budgeted annually for work throughout the City), new 2019 CIP projects (i.e., replacement of street signage), or other funding (i.e., ComEd credits). The donation agreement with the Jaycees obligates the Jaycees to donate \$200,000 to the Riverwalk Foundation over a period of no more than ten years to partially cover costs associated with the construction and maintenance of the park. The agreement states that the Jaycees are not otherwise responsible for any maintenance of the park.

Has the Park District provided input?

Yes, the Park Board of Commissioners approved the Jaycees Park at their April 12, 2018 meeting.

On first blush I have following concerns: The solid overhead wood roof features will accumulate snow, potentially people climbing on the roof plus graffiti plus solid roofs are an increased maintenance item. Maybe the solid wood roofs can be changed to a rolling outdoor fabric for retraction during inclement weather, auto retraction weather indicators may be available depending upon application.

The roof of the shade structures will not be a solid wood structure but spaced out dimensional lumber $(3" \times 6")$ that will give shade to the patrons below. It is not designed to hold out precipitation of any kind. Currently the design is over 11 feet high and we feel that even standing on a 30 inch table that vandals will have a very hard time trying to deface this dimensional lumber and getting on top of these structures.

Can you provided a layover landscape plan including current landscape verses proposed, new trees, trellis vines or other soft scape items?

The landscape plan provided shows the existing trees to remain (lighter tree symbol) along with the new landscape (darker tree symbols).

Vines along the wooden poles may provide a softer sterile look.

The shade trellis posts and frame are steel with an extremely durable and rust resistant powder coat finish similar to steel play structures. We do not recommend vines on these types of shade structures due to increased maintenance.
