G. CONSENT AGENDA:

Q:	Please provide a consolidated response for all purchasing items on the consent agenda. What are the repercussions of delaying the vote on these purchases and what are the repercussions of deferring these purchases.	Sullivan
A:	Per the City's procurement code, vendors are only required to hold their pricing for 90 days after the bid opening. The City can ask the low bidder to hold their pricing after 90 days, but the bidder is under no obligation to hold the pricing.	
A:	Item G-5: Cured in Place Watermain Lining: This is for a 16" watermain that goes under a railroad track. Based on its age this item is not recommended for deferral. Item K-1: 2020 Sanitary Sewer Service Lateral Lining and Vac-A-Tee Installation: This project is a significant component of the City's inflow & infiltration (I&I) reduction program. I&I reduction efforts is a required component of the City's NPDES permit with the IEPA. For these reasons, this item is not recommended for deferral. Item G-10: Distribution Automation Equipment: This item is related to the gear that restores customer's electricity automatically in an event of an unplanned outage, greatly reducing the number of customers impacted. It is important to award this item as soon as possible as to get on the vendor's production schedule (currently 6-7 months, and increasing with temporary shut downs during this time). Deferring this award pushes us further out on the production schedule and thus increases our risk of an outage impacting a greater number of customers. Item G-7: Pavement Patching, Item G-9: Pavement Crackfilling and Item K-2: Microsurfacing Program: These three contracts are part of the street maintenance improvement program. All three of them are preservation techniques we use to extend the life of our pavements. These are the three most important contracts in our street preservation program; anytime we talked about what were the contracts we had to do every year these are the top ones. If we do not continue to invest in the preservation of our streets today then we will pay significantly more to perform more costly improvements later. Staff strongly recommends awarding these contracts since it is better to pay a reasonable amount this year than much more in later years.	Blenniss/Podlesny/ Novack/Dublinksi

A:	The budget amount was based on a 3% inflation rate per year over original purchase cost of the units. The actual inflation was more than 4% per year. Staff will adjust to a 5% increase per year on heavy equipment purchases to better account for the greater inflation per year.	Dublinski
Q:	What vehicles are we going to find the \$43,000 in savings?	Hinterlong
A:	Based on DPW vehicle replacements already purchased and specifications that are close to being final, we anticipate that DPW's vehicle replacement budget will be approximately \$20,000 under budget. Examples of these savings are Unit 869, Trackless Unit which was more than \$50,000 under budget and Unit 299, Front End Loader which we anticipate being \$25,000 under budget.	Dublinski
