

Hope you are staying safe and healthy and had a great Thanksgiving weekend!

This is Shishir Ranjan, a resident of south Naperville in Ashwood Pointe subdivision off of 248th since 2016. I'm reaching out to you in relation to this upcoming ICN project. I notice on the website that it is under review and being a resident of Ashwood Pointe, I am reaching out as it will directly affect our community and us. Our subdivision is exactly opposite to the proposed site and based on what I have learnt about the ICN project, I have a very growing concern about this.

To give you some more background about my concerns:

We have lived in Chicago suburbs (Arlington Heights, Mount Prospect and Schaumburg) for about 9 years before moving to Naperville in 2016 after purchasing a beautiful dream home for my family and with a dream of a peaceful and pleasant life in one of the most coveted suburbs. The well deserving Naperville has been a place we call home very fondly and we live a happy life with our elementary and middle school going kids. They also have academic and sports classes during the weekdays including gymnastics, mathematics, robotics and swimming, soccer etc to name a few which requires the two of us to manage the schedule very meticulously counting every minute in the morning and evening hours to do pick up and drops.

Upon my research about ICN and the scale of the project, I am concerned how it would affect our already very busy life

with a lot more dependency on predictable traffic and running between the schedules. Given the size, and the purpose of this, it is clear that it will attract a very huge number of people from everywhere in the western suburbs to come to this place of worship and that will cause a very heavy load on the single road and it will severely affect the otherwise blissful life of adjacent peaceful communities like ours. You can imagine hundreds of cars suddenly popping into a residential area and causing a huge traffic nightmare and delays to everyone who lives here and who loves to live here. I am concerned that this big of a place which is going to be used for congregations, festivals, religious events and weekend programs, it will cause a big chaos for such a small area like ours to suddenly be flooded by several hundreds of cars, thousands of people, many of them out of town, and very likely cause a question on safety and security of our very peaceful residential community.

I cannot understand the rationale behind allowing this such a very large scale construction which will bring hundreds of people into such a small area. Although this will not be a commercial complex, it is no less than a place that potentially requires very well thought through city planned entry/exit points and not be based at the heart of a peaceful residential area. This will probably cause us and several of our friends to consider moving elsewhere due to traffic and security concerns. The privacy of our lives will be at stake as I anticipate many of the traffic getting diverted from the inside of the subdivision in order to avoid the traffic on 248 and that will mean issues for residents like us.

I have seen many other religious buildings are allowed to be on alongside some main road or at an intersection which enables multiple entry/exits but in case of ICN, it is exactly opposite of that. There are no intersections and the entry and exits are both going to be on 248th which is at the gate of our community and will impact the society. There are hundreds of kids playing within our subdivision freely but I am concerned that ICN will bring several cars in this area and will also cause driving concerns, rash driving, safe movement of residents etc.

By way of this email, I wanted to register my concern over this upcoming project that is under review. Kindly take a note of this and consider this for decision makers to review the concerns and give it a thought in the larger interest of our subdivision and residents like me who have a family to manage and live a peaceful life with every minute being important in managing schedule.

I hope this will be considered in the right manner and an informed decision be made not to disadvantage the residents of our or nearby communities who, like me, are living in their dream home and living the american dream.

Once again, Thank you for your leadership in this matter and I am confident you will put yourselves into our shoes and use the lens of a resident to evaluate this project and help move it to an appropriate place that is well supported by the city's infrastructure. In my view, 248th isn't the right spot for this.

I am a Tall Grass resident and I would like to register my concerns regarding the planned development by the ICN on 248th Ave.

Considering the scale of the ICN with regards to:

- 1. Current parking lot of 700+ spaces, with a future planned 900+
- 2. School for K 5
- 3. Mosque
- 4. Community Hall
- 5. Gymnasium

My concerns are as follows:

- 1. We already have an increase in the noise level on 95th street due to the expansion of the houses in the Ashwood Pointe subdivision. The scale of the ICN development will only ensure that the traffic increases at all times during the day.
- 2. There is absolutely bound to be an increase in the traffic flow on Tall Grass Drive and Deering Bay drive by South bound congregants, especially during popular times.

When faced with the inevitable congestion on the single lane 248th ave and 103rd street, the Deering Bay & Tall Grass Drive entrances into the Tall Grass subdivision are bound to be attractive alternatives.

We already have issues on both of these internal streets with speeding and not obeying stop signs, by predominantly younger drivers who actually live in the neighborhood.

Allowing non-residents who will typically care next to nothing, especially if they view Tall Grass as a transit block to their destination, is going to make the situation exponentially worse.

Putting a "No through traffic" or "Please drive slow" or "guarantees" that congregants won't drive through, is not an answer and ineffectual, in my opinion.

3. Similarly, the residents of both Ashwood Pointe and & Tall Grass, who use the bike trail that cuts across 248th, Tall Grass Dr. and Deering Bay Dr. are going to face increased traffic at those touch points.

This is especially dangerous for the children using the trail, who let's face it, aren't as vigilant when it comes to traffic.

There may be plans by the City of Naperville to widen 248th Street, but that isn't until 2024 if I'm not mistaken.

The scale of the development, in my opinion, ensures that the above issues will manifest.

Furthermore, I have read the response of the ICN to the Tall Grass board & residents regarding effect on property values. If it can be stated without any proof that property values can go up or are unaffected, I should be allowed to state the opposite equally:

I do believe the property values will go down due to the reasons I've mentioned. In general the only items, in the immediate vicinity of a neighborhood, that increase single home property values are children's parks & good schools. Densely packed structures that generate traffic unrelated to a large portion of the residents, do not.

Naperville & Aurora as a whole might become a more attractive destination, but definitely not the Tall Grass neighborhood. Or Ashwood Pointe for that matter.

A structure, any structure, of this scale does not belong sandwiched between single family homes.

- Traffic levels- The stretch of 248th from Landsdown to 95th street is already extremely busy. Kids, including ours, use 248th street to commute to Waubonsie Valley. As the parent of a young driver, it would be extremely concerning if current traffic levels go up not just because of the increase in commute time but also because of the resulting increase in accidents both major and minor.

This is Shishir Ranjan, a resident of south Naperville in Ashwood Pointe subdivision off of 248th since 2016. I'm reaching out to you in relation to this upcoming ICN project. I notice on the website that it is under review and being a resident of Ashwood Pointe, I am reaching out as it will directly affect our community and us. Our subdivision is exactly opposite to the proposed site and based on what I have learnt about the ICN project, I have a very growing concern about this.

To give you some more background about my concerns:

We have lived in Chicago suburbs (Arlington Heights, Mount Prospect and Schaumburg) for about 9 years before moving to Naperville in 2016 after purchasing a beautiful dream home for my family and with a dream of a peaceful and pleasant life in one of the most coveted suburbs. The well deserving Naperville has been a place we call home very fondly and we live a happy life with our elementary and middle school going kids. They also have academic and sports classes during the weekdays including gymnastics, mathematics, robotics and swimming, soccer etc to name a few which requires the two of us to manage the schedule very meticulously counting every minute in the morning and evening hours to do pick up and drops.

Upon my research about ICN and the scale of the project, I am concerned how it would affect our already very busy life with a lot more dependency on predictable traffic and running between the schedules. Given the size, and the purpose of this, it is clear that it will attract a very huge number of people from everywhere in the western suburbs to come to this place of worship and that will cause a very heavy load on the single road and it will severely affect the otherwise blissful life of adjacent peaceful communities like ours. You can imagine hundreds of cars suddenly popping into a residential area and causing a huge traffic nightmare and delays to everyone who lives here and who loves to live here. I am concerned that this big of a place which is going to be used for congregations, festivals, religious events and weekend programs, it will cause a big chaos for such a small area like ours to suddenly be flooded by several hundreds of cars, thousands of people, many of them out of town, and very likely cause a question on safety and security of our very peaceful residential community.

I cannot understand the rationale behind allowing this such a very large scale construction which will bring hundreds of people into such a small area. Although this will not be a commercial complex, it is no less than a place that potentially requires very well thought through city planned entry/exit points and not be based at the heart of a peaceful residential area. This will probably cause us and several of our friends to consider moving elsewhere due to traffic and security concerns. The privacy of our lives will be at stake as I anticipate many of the traffic getting diverted from the inside of the subdivision in order to avoid the traffic on 248 and that will mean issues for residents like us.

I have seen many other religious buildings are allowed to be on alongside some main road or at an intersection which enables multiple entry/exits but in case of ICN, it is exactly opposite of that. There are no intersections and the entry and exits are both going to be on 248th which is at the gate of our community and will impact the society. There are hundreds of kids playing within our subdivision freely but I am concerned that ICN will bring several cars in this area and will also cause driving concerns, rash driving, safe movement of residents etc.

By way of this email, I wanted to register my concern over this upcoming project that is under review. Kindly take a note of this and consider this for decision makers to review the concerns and give it a thought in the larger interest of our subdivision and residents like me who have a family to manage and live a peaceful life with every minute being important in managing schedule.

I hope this will be considered in the right manner and an informed decision be made not to disadvantage the residents of our or nearby communities who, like me, are living in their dream home and living the american dream.

Once again, Thank you for your leadership in this matter and I am confident you will put yourselves into our shoes and use the lens of a resident to evaluate this project and help move it to an appropriate place that is well supported by the city's infrastructure. This is in reference to the plans submitted by ICN for the construction of the Islamic community center at site 3540 on 248th Ave, Naperville. My family moved to the Ashwood Pointe Community back in 2016 and we immediately fell in love with the serene, safe and quiet residential neighborhood. I am extremely concerned with the proposed ICN project which will change the entire dynamic of this neighborhood. It will bring a constant influx of people and traffic which will disturb the tranquility and safety of this quiet neighborhood.

As an active property owner very close to the site, I strongly object to the proposed project. There are several reasons that are a cause of concern to me and my family.

- 1. The size of the project and its growth plans are not suited for the neighboring residential communities. This project will introduce significant additional traffic that is orders of magnitude more than current state causing access problems to residents in multiple subdivisions including mine. I have family members requiring frequent medical treatment and I am deeply concerned with the amount of traffic this project brings to an already congested neighborhood.

I'm a resident of Ashwood Pointe Subdivision in South of Naperville. Recently I have learned about the ICN development on 248th avenue. I am writing to inform you and others concerned in the City regarding my views about the ICN project which will be located exactly opposite to our community and ~0.2 miles from my home.

Background and facts about our community:

- Ashwood Pointe Community has 248 homes
- There are more than 350+ school going kids (mostly elementary) in our community
- Wolfs Crossing Park is right to next our community on the west side.
- Transmission Power lines and railroad is on west and north of our community

I have reached my decision to oppose after research, consultations and considerable thought. In addition to sharing my opposition to the project I would also like to my reasons:

Reasons:

- 1. We are a family of 4 with 2 young kids (11 and 6 year). The reason we moved so far south into Naperville was because we wanted to raise our kids in a quiet, peaceful, family oriented community. Location of this center is on 248th avenue and is right in the middle of many existing and recently developed subdivisions including our community(Ashwood Pointe). Development of ICN or another other large community center will bring lots of unwanted commercial and social activity into this area thus disturbing the family friendly nature of this locality.
- 2. Scope, scale and size of the ICN center appears to be really large for it to be located smack in the middle of a residential area.
- It is said that ICN when fully developed will include a place of worship, school, health center and more.
 This will likely lead to significant increase of traffic, causing sound and air pollution which will affect the health of people living in our community.
- 4. Assuming ICN will likely be used for congregations and celebrations during festivals, it will attract 1000s of people causing *large spillover of parking into our community disrupting free movement of people and vehicles in our community.*
- 5. It is said that ICN is likely going to be the largest center in the Midwest; it will likely attract visitors from other parts of the state, continental USA and possibly other countries. This will **put our locality on the**

- **global map as a Non-Residential location** and negatively impact our property values and our ability to find buyers to sell our homes in future.
- 6. Based on the information we have reviewed so far it appears like ICN will have a facade of ~80ft in height with multiple structures. Having such a massive structure will likely change the look and feel of this area from residential to commercial and could affect our property values in the long run.
- 7. Wolf's Crossing Park was developed and inaugurated to the west of our community in 2020. ICN is proposed to be located on the East of Ashwood Pointe. Our community will get sandwiched between these 2 massive developments and could become a focal point for unwanted and unwarranted flow of people and activities causing security concerns for the residents.
- 8. As we go around Naperville and other villages, we typically see that religious and community centers are located at street intersections to allow traffic movement in multiple directions. 

As the owner of a home on Lapp Lane just north of the Islamic Center the following is a partial list of my concerns.

- 1. There is too much construction for the space available. The only area not covered in pavement or buildings is the retention pond along the east end. This time of year reminds us of the hundreds of migratory birds that use this space. They will miss their landing site.
- 2. A berm along the north side would be highly desirable for those of us residents that live on the south side of Lapp Lane. A tree line similar to that in Tamarack along 248th on top of the berm would improve the site line, cut down on light pollution and help with noise abatement. Additionally I see no need to provide access to the bike/walking path from the Islamic Center. If necessary, an entrance or two should be sufficient.
- 3. The view to the Islamic Center from the neighborhoods is the less desirable back sides of the buildings. The towers are not stressed in the plans but would also affect the views.
- 4. For my house, in particular, the view from our bedroom faces the Islamic Center and no amount of buffering is going to stop the lighting from the parking lots. This is a major concern for us, as at our age early to bed is the norm. The parking lots on the north side would probably be the least used, so maybe this lighting could be used sparingly.
- 5. Traffic is a concern for us as well.
- 6. Noise?
- 7. When we moved into Penncross Knoll (2002), we were told our high school was Neuqua Valley, the railroad to our west only ran two trains a day and the church behind our house was the little building in the Southwest corner of the lot. We lost Neuqua Valley, CN bought the railroad and runs many more trains per day and now the Islamic Center. I gotta believe my house value has taken a significant hit.

Thanks for your response. We have been following the updates regarding the ICN construction. Our concerns are growing more tahn ever, since we are getting familiar with more details.

Here are some concerns:

The proximity to the Parking lot from the south side and east side property lines is 10 feet. This literally makes it right next to our backyard. The Parking space is depicted at close to 719 + some additional parking spaces. This means a lot of traffic right impacting our property lines. This is really a very high number compared to the lot size.

ICN is also encouraging foot traffic - and this will also have an effect on the peace and tranquility of the neighborhood and especially impacts us because of just 10 feet separation. A big concern is also the 'number' of meetings that will be held each and every day. This will mean a constant traffic and the noise factor that we residents will have to endure each and every day.

We also learnt that ICN is not including a berm on the southside and east side. As per our understanding, this will not create a barrier tall enough to keep our privacy with our backyards. This is very upsetting to know that 700+ vehicles will be parked and will have visibility to our homes.

Wishing you Happy Holidays in advance.

I am writing to you as a concerned resident of Tallgrass subdivision on the corner of 59/95 street in Naperville relating to the construction of new ICN (Islamic Center of Naperville). Below are some of my concerns relating to the construction of ICN in our neighborhood.

- 1. As per the plan shared by ICN, they are constructing 730+ parking spots. This is a huge number keeping in mind that ICN will have this much traffic at least 5 times a day as they accept prayers 5 times a day. Based on my limited knowledge of islam, people subscribing to Islam are required to pray at least 5 times a day.
- 2. In addition to above parking spaces, a lot of traffic is expected through taxi/Uber/Lyft, etc.
- 3. We are already seeing lot of traffic congestion during peak times of the day like school time and office hours. Adding above traffic to it will result in horrific traffic problems.
- 4. Due to the above, people will start going through inner roads of the tallgrass and neighboring communities. This will make the communities very unsafe for our kids. As of now, our children are free to roam within the community with little supervision but with this new ICN construction, it will become impossible for children to move around without constant supervision. This will have a huge impact on the development and social interaction of our children.
- 5. It is being constructed in the middle of the peaceful community which has already seen huge constructions projects around it in the last decade. This has already added a lot of traffic to this area.
- 6. The noise and air pollution due to increased traffic will increase a lot in the region. This will impact the values of our houses and quality of life for people living in our communities.
- 7. Keeping low end number of 800 cars' traffic five times a day and each car having an average of 4-5 people in them, we will have a congregation of about 4000+ people in the ICN. Imagine the amount of noise pollution it will have when they will offer prayers collectively 5 times a day. The impact of this will be huge for residents of the community.
- 8. Similarly, having this big congregation of people at least 5 times a day will also present huge law and order challenges in the area. Making the communities very unsafe to live and raise families.
- 9. Searching internet about the illegal activities being run from such centers around the world will bring thousands of results back. Similarly, searching for law and order issues created due to such centers will also bring a lot of interesting data pointing in the direction of not allowing ICN to move forward with their plan within Tallgrass and neighboring communities.
- 10. Performing a simple google search for "Mosques near me" brought back over 33 results (33 Mosques/Masjids) within a radius of 20 miles and almost 2 dozen within 10 miles of tallgrass subdivision. How many more mosques/masjid do we need around this area? Don't you think it should sound some alarms keeping in mind the population of people aligning with Islam in the state is just 2.5%?

- 11. Comparison of people identifying themselves with Islam vs christianity is 2.5% 97.0% which is like 1:20 ratio whereas the worship places is nearly 1:4 in ratio in this area. Do we still need more such places in the middle of peaceful communities cluster?
- 12. Our law and order resources (Police personnel) are already stretched thin and providing regular traffic management and other law and order incidents due to increased traffic and people congregation in the area will further stretch them.
- 13. In a nut shell, short and long term effects of moving forward with ICN in tallgrass subdivision will be disastrous for not just our community but multiple surrounding communities of the area.
- 14. Our concerns are very legitimate and founded on historic data, the facts presented by the ICN in the proposals and experience of the communities having such centers in the midst of their communities.

Hoping for a kind consideration will be given to the above concerns of a very a peace loving and concerned resident of tallgrass community.

Hello, my name is TM Narasimhan, residing @

in the Tall Grass Subdivision.

I recently came to know that there is a huge multistage development for a Mosque and islamic School etc on 248th Street within the Tallgrass Community. I am personally astounded that the city is even thinking of giving approval for this center with over 700 parking spaces, WOW! This parking will bring anywhere from 2500 to 3000 people into a normal, tranquil community multiples times a week and not to mention traffic for the school drop off and pick up etc. This is assuming a combination of 5 seater Cars and Minivans.

As such with new developments North to South between 83rd and 111th Street and Rte 59 and Wolf Road there is almost doubling of traffic and often times it would take me 3 lights to 4 light cycles to get on to route 59 from 95th street going east and if you add 700 cars to the mix with people rushing in and out for prayers and driving to make time in a 25 mile neighborhood. This will be equal to adding almost 300+ plus homes in tallgrass subdivision virtually, resulting in actual increase in traffic during times when Fry and SCullen will be let out also. - Though there is estimated population of Asians in the Naperville area is about 18% according to some reports, the actual percentage of the population using ICN may be less(<4% as per some estimates as not all asians practice same faith to go to ICN) and there are already 3 facilities in near vicinity or neighborhood's. So the proposed Midwest largest construction of the facility in a thickly dense population will disturb the safety and quality of the living in this area. So an alternate site may be proposed. The relevant studies of demographics are not presented to the residents to justify this.
- Proposed school in this facility will have an impact on the top rated schools in Naperville area as these school curriculum will not be decided by IL or Naperville school districts.
- With large gatherings there are possible safety concerns and no facts presented by NPD of their plan to ensure traffic regulation and other safety measure that is shared with residents.

Keeping in view of the above I request the city to offer an alternate proposal so that there is amicable solution satisfying both residents and ICN.

We live in Tall Grass on a property that borders the ICN project on 248th St. We feel a development of this magnitude built on a parcel of land that has residential homes on all sides of it, isn't a suitable location for commercial buildings and parking lots. The full 5 phase plan is better suited on a property without residential homes surrounding all sides and that has main arterial road access where traffic wouldn't be an issue.

The scope of this project is massive. As a resident that directly borders this plan, a 5 Phase plan that is going to be under construction for 10+ years is hard to imagine. A School, Multipurpose Hall, Gym, Playground and 700+ parking spaces? This is what raises a red flag for us. We urge the City to ask ICN to scale back. Why would the city allow a project to move forward for the next 10-30 years with non stop construction?

They are available for reference at the following link: https://owncloud.naperville.il.us/index.php/s/Tj1W3yulNzbtxDX. City staff will be reviewing the plans over the next couple of weeks for technical compliance with their codes. At this time, no public hearing date has been identified. However, if/when the City deems the project ready to pass along to the Planning & Zoning Commission, the public hearing will be scheduled 15-30 days out. In order to meet public notice requirements, this means that the earliest public hearing date available will not be until December 2nd, which means the earliest this would make the Council Meeting agenda is December 15th (which would be rushed), so more realistically, the meeting would occur in January of 2021. If Council approves, they will need to submit for final engineering approval before construction occurs.

As we receive more updates on this project, we will continue to pass them along. In the meantime, we encourage residents to email Sara Kopinski, Community planner directly (KopinskiS@naperville.il.us) with any comments, questions or concerns about this project.

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Concerns related to proposed development of the ICN property on 248th Street in South Naperville.

As a neighbor in the Tall Grass Subdivision I would like to express significant concern with the proposed ICN Site Plan for the property. My biggest issue/concern is the size of the land parcel compared to what is proposed to be built, not during Phase One, but during the subsequent phases (which if the plan gets approved will give them the basis to continue with the additional phases in the future). Additionally, the fact that it is a parcel surrounded by residential development makes the size and scope of the project even more inappropriate.

If the project were slated for the southeast corner of Route 59...which is empty space currently, I would not blink... it has nothing to do with the fact that it's a church/mosque/temple... or anything to do with what religion is involved... it is 100% a space and property value issue to me. What is being proposed is too large, has too much parking, and is expecting too much traffic for the location chosen. I could see a small church/temple/mosque on that site and would have zero issues with it. The size and scope of this proposed project on that small parcel is an issue.

According to the site plans provided to Tall Grass, much of the parking (particularly in later phases) is directly against residential backyards... there can be no question that that is going to have a huge negative impact on those housing values and as that includes two full blocks of houses along Mistflower Drive (besides the houses effected on the North side of the property in Pencross Knolls), is a significant number of houses in the Tall Grass development. The negative effect on those particular values will drive down comparables in the area and therefore all property values throughout the neighborhood.

Finally, the phased nature of this project will result in years of construction noise, dirt, and disruption to the surrounding residential houses. Given the close proximity of the proposed structure to existing houses there will be little to no way to mitigate the disruption to the residential neighbors, and seeing the number of proposed phases involved could easily stretch well past 3-5 years of nearly full-time construction.

With all of these issue in mind, I would encourage the City of Naperville to take a much closer look at this project before granting any approvals and to encourage ICN to investigate other sites that would provide a wider footprint with less residential disruption for such a large scale project.

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Dear Sara and Members of the Planning Commission,

I am writing in regards to the ICN project in Southwest Naperville.

Let me start by saying that I believe religious institutions provide human beings with a needed place for spiritual discovery, ritual and reflection as well as providing a social community. It has been my personal experience that religion institutions, across various faiths, want to augment the communities they call home.

That said, I have a few concerns about the conditional use ICN is requesting to this R1 Zoning site.

- 1) This site is surrounded by single family residential on all sides. It shares a land boundary with Tall Grass on the east and south sides. It is visible to Penncross Knoll across the open Com Ed easement on the north side and to Ashwood across 248th to the west. The zoning for this plot of land is R1- Single Family Housing and is surrounded by single family housing, ICN has asked for a Conditional Use. That, in and of itself, shows that some additional thought should be given to this request. I draw attention to the Naperville Code of Ordinances 6-3-8 #2- Standards For Conditional Uses. Is a religious institution, of any faith, a good fit for this plot of land?
- 2) Large religious institutions create large amounts of traffic. It is my understanding that the Muslim faith has multiple calls to prayer during the day. This means traffic will be an issue that must be discussed. Having only one side to provide entrance/exits increases the traffic impact to the surrounding community. Take Holy Spirit at Book at 111th, constructed in the past 20 years. While they share two boundaries with single family residential, they are located on a corner which allows traffic access on two separate roads reducing the overall traffic impact. The proposed ICN site is not conducive to the large influx of congregates who will utilize the site. This concern will worsen as ICN has presented multiple future phases of this project which will likely increase traffic counts and concerns..
- 3) ICN has proposed two full entrances and exits. In discussions with City engineers, I understand the City does not support the North entrance being a full intersection. I share this concern. A full north intersection would require a left turning lane from southbound 248th into the ICN's proposed site. This left hand lane will cause cars to stack, impeding the existing pedestrian/bike crossing. This crossing is used regularly by residents and their safety requires consideration. This entrance should be a restricted one. Right in, right out.
- 4) 248th already has 3 stoplights from 103rd to 95th street. While I understand the counts would not support another stoplight at the proposed south entrance now, it is expected that in a few years the conditions could warrant another stoplight at this (Honey Locust) intersection. Do we really need another stop light on such a short stretch of road?
- 5) The parking on this proposed site is vast in size. I would encourage the petitioners and the City to look for environmentally friendly options for such a large expanse. One such option is the choice utilized in the Whole Foods/Nordstrom Rack lot north of 75th Street.
- 6) I have seen comments on the height of the dome and the minaret. I understand Naperville code allows for certain exceptions to height rule, If exceptions were to be granted, I would ask that ICN be in line with other religious institutions

or similarly categorized buildings existing in Naperville today- especially given the nature of being surrounded by single family residences.

- 7) Surrounding neighbors concerns about noise and light pollution as well as water management should be given consideration. Buffering and containment will be necessary given the expanse of the project.
- 8) Lastly, seeing the architectural rending of the Phase One structure, this building has substantial mass and bulk. I wonder if there is a way to design the complex that honors the Muslim faith/ICN's needs and blends in with the surrounding community?

I appreciate the opportunity to share my concerns and welcome positive, collaborative discussion with all stakeholders.

Below please find my concerns as a Tall Grass resident living in close proximity to the area.

The complex of buildings and parking lots planned for this location is too big and inappropriate for these reasons:

- 1. Flooding and environmental issues. The northeast area of the current field tends to flood slightly. If the property is built according to the plan, that means a fully built up area with no greenery and only a pond on the east side by the houses it will result in flooding when the pond overflows. We already have the same kind of problem with the ponds that are in the middle of the Tall Grass and the proposed project would only multiply this issue.
- 2. Esthetic part. This complex of buildings is huge and not suitable for the area in the middle of residential houses. A much smaller building could potentially be built closer to 248th.- away from the houses.
- 3. Diversity. The month of Ramadan requires believers to pray before dawn. This means a lot of traffic (lights and noise early in the morning 5 am or so) in the middle of the residential area for 30 days. There is no wide green area protecting current neighbors from this in the plan. A fence will not do it. There is a very high chance that non Muslim home owners will move out which will result in changing the area into a monolithic neighborhood. I would suggest that the decision makers look outside Naperville for cons and pros of this situation and the consequences of creating muslim enclave in south-west corner for the whole Naperville.

The project as presented is suitable for a different location - similar to the ICN location on Ogden Ave., which I think is perfect - early morning traffic does not bother anybody and overflow of the cars can park across the street on a commercial parking lot. ICN can also go west where there are still a lot of huge field areas where there will be no interference with a residential area.

I understand from our HOA Tall Grass meeting on 8/31/2020 that plans have been submitted to the City of Naperville for review and permit.
Does the City need to change zoning from 'A-1' to 'A-1 with conditional use'?
The property is currently zoned R1. The petitioner is seeking a conditional use for a religious institution in the R1 District.

What is the status of the plans?

ICN submitted a formal Petition for Development Approval on 6/17/2020. The City conducted a $1^{\rm st}$ review of the Petition and associated plans and documents and provided comments back to ICN on 7/7/2020. We are waiting for the revised plans to be

submitted to address the City's comments. A Planning and Zoning Commission public hearing will not be scheduled for this case until staff determines that all major comments have been addressed.

What is the City Code on height limits for the buildings being proposed?

The R1 zoning district limits the height of buildings to 2 ½ stories not to exceed 35 ft. Chimneys, ornamental towers, scenery lofts, monuments, cupolas, domes, spires, steeples, false mansards, parapet walls, and similar structures

and necessary mechanical appurtenances are exempt from height limitations.

Can I come to the City Office and look at the plans that were submitted.

The City doesn't receive hard copy plans anymore. We are working on uploading an electronic copy of the plans to the City's website for you to view. Once the web link is set up next week, I will forward it to you.

Since the project is expected to be done in 5 phases, what condition must be maintained for property in subsequent phases to be completed +/- 10 years in the future? The petitioner's phasing

plan will be reviewed as part of the entitlement process. At this time, the petitioner has requested approvals for all entitlements that would be necessary to achieve the final buildout. The details of each phase and interim property status/conditions have

not been identified yet; however, staff will continue to work with the petitioner on these details prior to the public hearing. Staff has requested that the petitioner provide a detailed phasing plan for our review.

I am most interested in what ICN proposes in site work and buffer to my property location. That is berms, fencing, water detention, building lighting and parking lot lighting.
The petitioner's engineering plans, landscape plan, and photometric plan will be most helpful in communicating site work proposed and any buffering that is part of this project. At this point, the plans proposed
are in the preliminary stages and some of these details may not be finalized until the time final engineering. The Municipal Code requires a 6 ft. fence to extend around the entire perimeter of the side yards and rear yard due to adjacent residentially zoned
properties

My wife and I have recently learned about the plans for a large Islamic Center to be built on property on 248th street in Naperville.

We live in Ashwood Crossing close by and have serious concerns about this property being built out and used as planned.

Our community and the surrounding area is primarily residential with schools, recreation path and a new community park being the only non-residential use infrastructure nearby. We settled here because of the residential character of community the area offers.

The plan for a site so large as this to be built on this particular piece of property will greatly change our community, negatively impacting residents and homeowners that settled here seeking to live in a residential area free from high traffic and off of a primary access way.

It is my observation that the traffic use for 248th street is primary to the residents that commute to and from their homes, shopping, etc.. There is not a large influx of traffic drawn to any one site using the roads leading in and out of our residential communities nearby.

248th street is not a major thoroughfare and even when the project to extend the dual separated 2 lanes north and south, is completed, it not going to be used as a primary traffic route outside of local resident access.

The property and proposed build out has only a single street access to and from and is planned for high density use and an overwhelmingly large number of parking spaces. That one access point can only dump large volumes of traffic out onto one road; 248th street.

I can not see how changes in the traffic attracted to such a site and use for the purposes planned will enhance our community properties in any way. To the contrary, as a local area resident, I believe it would be a serious mistake for Naperville to approve such a project of this planned magnitude, knowing the plans for use of this property.

High traffic volume in compressed times and large gatherings of people, in a building complex of high density use at multiple scheduled times during each and every week is going to be a huge disruption to the residents in the area.

The volume of traffic with only one entrance and exit onto 248th Street is a poor plan for volumes of people coming and going in and out of a limited access point.

Therefore, I am writing to be on the public record, as a resident living within the area that will be greatly impacted, should this plan be approved!

I am firmly against such use of this property!

I am writing to you about the project in South Naperville for the new Islamic Center. I have several concerns about the project. One of the them is that the subdivision where it will be (practically) already has two schools: an elementary and a middle school. The center is projected to have a school, there would be three schools in one subdivision. Even changing the entrance to 248, many parents will be dropping off their kids in the streets close to the school inside the subdivision, as the do when they drop off the students at Fry and Scullen. The drop-off from those two schools is already a concern in our subdivision with the traffic and lack of following procedure and or speed limits. If you look at other places of worship, they are not in the middle of a neighborhood and need police to help out with traffic once service ends. In this case imagine the traffic on Fridays?

I am not sure if you are aware, 248 is a street widely used by teenagers (all of them have at most months or 1 year of experience driving) from: Ashwood, Tamarack and Tall Grass to get to Waubonsie and Nequa. Can you imagine the traffic on a one lane street? Before and after school? 248 can't handle that traffic. Once that school opens do you really want elementary school students in their bikes and teenagers driving late to school sharing the streets? That is a very dangerous situation.

You could always ask for the accident reports in the mornings. I am a teacher and I drive to my school and see at least one accident every week. There are minor accidents, however, they could turn into other kind of accidents if this project is approved.

I strongly beg you to reconsider the safely of students when you approve this project as well as the impact to a subdivision with three schools. I do no know of any other subdivision that has three schools. All the religious Temples, Churches, and Mosques in the area have easy access to a main street (59, Ogden, Eola) with at least two lanes, and are not in the middle of a subdivision. If they are considering 719 parking spaces it a very big Religious Center.

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Ms. Kopinski:

I am a 29 year resident of Naperville, 18 years of which have been in the Tall Grass neighborhood. I am writing to express my concerns with the proposed Islamic Center of Naperville masjid on 248th Avenue. Specifically, I am concerned that this project will have an adverse affect on the overall traffic, safety and quality-of life in Tall Grass and the other adjacent residential neighborhoods. Below is a list of my concerns:

- The scope and scale of ICN's project is much too large for the 13.6 acre site, served by a minor arterial road, 248th Avenue
- The proposed 5 Phase project will be similar in square footage and have more parking spots than the Costco at 75th and Rt 59. Certainly, the City of Naperville would not approve a Costco for this location on 248th Avenue!
- The proposed masjid will be one of the largest in America in a community that is <10% muslim, as a result
 congregants will be drawn from areas far beyond the adjacent neighborhoods and the Naperville community as
 a whole
- When completed this project will host activities 12-18 hours a day, 7 days a week. One merely needs to review the ICN calendar for Ogden Avenue
- The proposed school will have 250 students (K-5), generating an additional 180 cars on weekday mornings/afternoons assuming 1.4 students/car
- The proposed weekend school will have 500 students on Saturdays generating additional 350 cars on Saturday mornings/afternoons assuming 1.4 students/car
- The multi-purpose room has a capacity of 500 people, this will be used for a multitude of activities, including rental space to generate revenues per ICN strategic plans
- Prayer services are held 5 times per day every week day generating hundreds of more trips daily on 248th
 Avenue which is already a stressed minor arterial roadway not scheduled for expansion until 2024
- The traditional Friday Afternoon Prayers with start times of approximately 1PM and 2PM, depending on position
 of the sun, will generate 580 cars to attend each service based on ICN Parking Study, this means that there will
 be over 1,000 cars on the 248th Avenue corridor between the 1PM and 2PM prayer times. (580 cars leaving
 mosque and 580 cars arriving)
 - 248th Avenue is a main route used by high school students and school buses at the time additional 580 cars will be on 248th Avenue
 - This is a huge safety concern!
- The KLOA Traffic Impact Study is wholly inadequate for the size and scope of this project
 - o It is merely an access/egress study for the project
 - o Traffic study is not comprehensive view of project's impact based on hours of operation
 - Traffic observations were only made on January 14th and did not include pedestrian/bike traffic

- o There is no commentary on impacts at various intersections on 248th Avenue including 103rd Street, Trumpet Avenue, Grassmere Road, 95th Street, Wolf's Crossing, Tall Grass Greenway Trail, etc
- o There is no commentary on vehicle divergence into surrounding residential neighborhoods to avoid traffic congestion created by mosque
- o There has been considerable home construction and opening of Wolf's Crossing Community Park since traffic study, which is not considered
- o For safety reasons, there is a recommendation of moving Tall Grass Greenway Trail to north to accommodate a turn lane into mosque. A plan needs to be developed and implemented before construction of project can begin!
- o The proposed north access/exit drive of masjid will be located next to Greenway trail, which will make an unsafe crossing less safe
- The Traffic Impact Study and Parking Study claim that only 580 parking spaces will be used at the masjid's busiest times. There is a significant disconnect between numbers provided for Traffic Study, Parking Study by ICN and scope of project
- The plans call for an 85' minaret and a domed roof over 40' high, these features are not consistent with the adjacent spaces and will be detrimental to the surrounding neighborhoods
- It is imperative that a bridge be built across 248th Avenue to provide safe crossing for bicyclists and pedestrians as they make their way to the newly opened Wolf's Crossing Community Park.

Before this project is considered by City Council, a more comprehensive traffic study should be required that evaluates project impact on transportation network in southwest Naperville. In addition to the traffic impact study a solution for the Tall Grass Greenway Trail must be presented. A pedestrian bridge for the Tall Grass Greenway Trail is the only safe solution to cross 248th Avenue should this project move forward.

Taken together, these factors are a significant detriment to the existing neighborhoods and do not warrant the approval of a conditional use permit for the Project. Simply put, the Project is too large for the existing parcel and its impacts too detrimental to the surrounding neighborhoods for the City to recommend approval.

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I am writing with concerns about the proposed 248th Islamic center for the enclosed residential area off of 248th.

My first concern is about traffic. 248th is already a busy road. Today it took me 10 minutes to get from 95th st to my home due to over 30 stopped cars on 248th today. It has been like this almost every day for the past few months. Furthermore, adding a large building and parking for almost 700 (which, along with places of worship, are almost always on large corners, not surrounded on 3 sides by homes) would increase the traffic dramatically.

Last week there was a horrible accident where someone took out an electrical pole. I see more of this coming.

Secondly, I have a major concern with the drainage plans that I see online. The SW corner of the lot floods at least 4-5 times a year, and behind my residence is where the main storm sewer is located. If the intention is to put a parking lot for 500 plus cars in that corner there is no where for the flood water to go, especially if the plan is for the drainage area to be on the eastern side.

These are my main concerns. When I moved into this great neighborhood, the plans were for a builder to build large homes in the field. I actually saw the plans and lot lines. The difference between 20 homes with 30-40 cars is a far cry from over 700 possible cars and the land it displaces.

Please take our concerns into consideration.

> I am reaching out to you in regards to your role in reviewing and sponsoring ICN's proposed mosque and lot construction. As a resident of Tall Grass, who regularly utilizes the entrance off of 248th and Landsdown, I am very concerned with two key issues related to the proposal.

Proposed expansion for the mosque on 248th Street

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Hello ... I am a resident at the Ashwood Crossing development at the corner of Trumpet and 248Th Street in Naperville IL.

I have been informed by various residents in this area of a proposal to expand the initial development to include a grade school as well a multi-purpose hall and gymnasium.

As a resident in this area, I am not in favor of it. I have extreme concerns about the potential changes this will bring to the neighborhood. The Wolf's Crossing Park has already created an increase in traffic for our area. This additional expansion will magnify the volume of traffic on 248th and adjacent street.

The proposed lane improvements for 248th will help but not alleviate the congestion that will exist if the expansion is approved. It will also add to the more traffic noise that exists on 248 and adjacent streets. The volume of traffic noise (trucks, newer vehicles with turbo engines, speeding motorcycles, etc.) have increased since we moved into this area back in 2018.

As a side issue, I do wish the city would monitor the traffic and related noise in the morning hours from 7:00 AM to 9:00 AM along 248th and Trumpet. Trumpet is a main artery for those traveling Wolf's Crossing Road to go east/west.

The homes within the communities along 248th have limited access to 248th at this time. The flow of traffic will significantly increase on 248th and throughout the surrounding neighborhood streets around this site. There is no direct access for traffic from Route 59 to this site other than 95th Street and 103rd Street. While 95th is four lanes, 103rd Street is only two lanes. There is also traffic from Wolf Crossing which is now busier as more people are traveling on this road as a connector go west or east to Route 59. The congestion on 248 between 95th and 103rd will undoubtably increase.

There are already 3 Naperville Parks within a mile of the proposed site. 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Good afternoon Sara,

I live on Mistflower Ln and our house backs up directly to the field in which this group is considering building. It is clear to me after reviewing the plans and understanding the sheer size of this complex, there are all kinds of issues that will arise for residents in the area.

The biggest concern for me is safety. 248th is going to be the main artery to get to and from the center and as a two lane highway, it just doesn't have the ability to support the massive influx of cars that will be coming in or going out whenever something is going on at the center. There is also a trail of walkers and bikers that is directly next to this field. With all of that traffic of people on foot, bike, and in cars on a street with insufficient space to accommodate all the traffic, it becomes a safety issue for everyone. This area just doesn't have the infrastructure to support the amount of traffic that this will create.

The next glaring concern is the size of this complex. The size of the building and then number of parking spots (700-900) is similar to that of Costco. Costco has an entrance on route 59, which is much more equipped to support this type of traffic, and it still gets backed up and can be a chaotic place to go into and out of. To try to put a similar building within this field, surrounded by a neighborhood, without proper infrastructure seems like a guaranteed disorderly mess. Due to the way a place like this operates, it would also result in people all arriving at once or leaving at the same time. This goes hand in hand with the safety issue, when it does not seem reasonable to support that size and scale of people coming and going all at once.

Since our property is adjacent to the field, this complex will be completely on top of our property. Their property line will be a mere 10 ft from ours. This will create noise, an eye sore, and have a drastic impact on the property value. We would be going from a peaceful field behind us to a chaotic parking lot with almost a thousand cars coming in at any given time. This is drastically different from what anyone reasonably wants their back yard to overlook. Our property is raised by 2 ft over the other property, meaning we will have a downhill view overlooking all of the comings and goings of the center. This gives us less privacy and also could create issues for people with kids who like to play in the backyards too. Having a bunch of strangers coming and going is not an ideal situation for any parent with kids who may be playing in the backyard.

This field, the neighborhood that surrounds it, and the only road that provides a reasonable entrance to the facility are all not equipped to service this type of traffic. The center will be a loud and busy eye sore that will really have a negative effect on those who live in the area around it. I really hope that you will consider this when making your decision as it seems like there are plenty of other plots of land in the Western Suburbs, not within a neighborhood, that could support this size of a complex. 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Hi Sara,

I hope this message finds you well.

I'm writing you today to express my concerns around the Islamic Center of Naperville plans. I am a Tall Grass resident and one of the home owners who's back yard bumps right up to the field that this ICN will be built.

I became increasingly shocked to say the least, as I learned more details about this project and proposed plans. With that said, I appreciate the opportunity to share some of the specific concerns I have as a result...

- SIZE- The size of this project (buildings & # of parking spaces) is extremely large & excessive compared to the size of the lot (allotted land) especially considering it's right in the middle of residential homes/neighborhood and not a commercial area. The # of parking lot spaces ranging anywhere from 719-901 is concerning for the size of the land and layout and really put it into perspective for me when comparing to the # of spaces that the Costco parking lot has... the ICN project is significantly more parking spaces than a very large & busy retail store... and we all know how crazy that Cosco parking lot is! The difference is that it is on a commercial area surrounded by other businesses, parking lots, and located on a main already high-traffic highway and not directly surrounded by homes. The types of parking lots that we typically see located within residential areas/neighborhoods such as Scullen Middle School which has about 350 parking spaces, is less than half the # of spaces proposed for the ISN.
- Traffic/Safety The amount of traffic that will consistently make 248th increasingly congested (as that's where the entrance/exits will exist is) is concerning for multiple reasons. Not only is that road already busy as is and is only 2 lanes making it hard to turn left into our neighborhood at times as is, but it is also right where the bike path that currently exists crosses the road leading to a more dangerous scenario to safely cross 248th. In addition to the congestion specifically on 248th, it will also increase traffic congestion on all surrounding main roads such as Rt. 59, 95th St., & 103rd and will likely lead to drivers using Tall Grass neighborhood roads as a shortcut to avoid the congestion... as a result of the additional traffic cutting through Tall Grass, will cause potential safety issue to the pedestrians, especially children within the neighborhood.

- Proximity to our property lines The proposed plan includes having only 10 feet from my property line. Not only, do I have concerns around noise factor, what we will visually see right from our yard, patio, and out our windows, but the biggest concern that all need to be sensitive to is how this will likely affect our property values. In addition to it being too close to our property lines, the plan also causes frustration and concern around the fact that the plan doesn't include trees or a berm to help separate and disguise the noise & view from our homes and backyards. I learned that although they proposed in their plan to install a 6 ft fence, but because of not having a berm and the difference of 2 ft from the ground level of our properties vs the ground level of the proposed parking lot... it will ultimately be like having only a 4 ft fence and resulting in a lack of privacy and full view of the parking lot.
- Overall Property Value/Home resell Value decrease As mentioned above, in many cases property values decrease as a direct result of something of this size & magnitude (similar to commercial) so close to residential property lines. In addition, many home owners like myself within Tall Grass either have and/or have intentions to continue to "update" our homes due to the age of homes and the competitive real-estate market due to what home-buyers want and in-style... with that said, I am hesitant to continue to invest such significant money into home improvements moving forward due to the "unknown" and significant concern I have around what this ICN project will likely do to our property values and overall re-sale potential based on decreased interest future home-buyers could have once the ICN project has begun/finished. This concern should be something considered by all Tall Grass owners overall, not just those of us that are directly surrounding the ICN as it could potentially affect resale value & efforts.

In conclusion, I share the same sentiment as many that if ICN wants project plan of this magnitude & size that there are other pieces of land located within Naperville that would be more suited and a better fit based on location & size. I'm hopeful that the City of Naperville has enough data and expressed concerns to decline any request for building permit and approvals needed for them to proceed and can try to propose/negotiate other potential locations to consider. If there are absolutely no alternative options they will consider and this location is indeed going to remain where they will build, I would then ask that the City of Naperville decline their current proposed plan and see that significant modifications to plans are made to scale back the size & magnitude to more appropriately fit the location, size of land, and setting of surrounding residential neighborhood.

As a resident of the Carillon community located at the intersection of 248th Avenue and 95th Street, I am writing to express my concerns/opinion regarding the construction of The Islamic Center of Naperville.

- 1. The area for the potential religious institution is residential. The lot is located directly next to a frequently used bike/running path. There is already a flashing yellow light to help with crossing 248th but I have watched most drivers ignore the signal as users try to cross a 45 mph street.

Hope things are well and you are staying safe and healthy during these unprecedented times we are seeing with COVID.

I am reaching out to you to express my genuine concern regarding the proposed ICN project on 248th Avenue right within 5 minutes walking distance from my home with the proposed scale of the project. I have been in Chicago area for 20+ years and 15 years in Naperville and 7 years at my existing home. When we say Naperville, we think of community, homes, kids, parks and all that keeps them safe and offers a nurturing environment.

A big development that eventually will have 900 parking spots with a mosque, community hall for gatherings/marriages, a proposed 500 children capacity school, gymnasium is totally the wrong development in the middle of area with residential neighborhoods for the following reasons:

- 1. It will increase traffic in the area. I can see the change in the traffic level from when I moved to the area 7 years ago with negligible traffic to now having to wait a couple of minutes to exit Lapp Lane. There has been a lot of new construction and another development with multiple facilities with constant use will only make the problem worse.
- 2. There are always cases where the proposed parking is not enough for the space and the additional vehicles will start to be parked on the residential streets. This blocks the visibility for the passing home traffic if the kids are crossing the street leading to safety concern for kids with chances for accidents.
- 3. Crossing 248th Avenue with this extra traffic will be more hazardous. With the newly built Wolfs Crossing Community Park, there is more pedestrian and bicycle activity at 248th Ave right at the proposed development site.
- 4. I checked the plans submitted for this proposed development on the City site. The traffic study was done on Jan 14, 2020 and mentions no pedestrian/ bicycle traffic. All I can tell you is no one is walking during the cold winter month of January or riding their bicycles. The numbers will be vastly different come Spring/summer/fall months. Currently my 3 bikes are hanging inside my garage and there are plenty of adults and kids riding bicycles in our area. The traffic study being done in January is totally flawed at best and some may even say it is purposely misleading.
- 5. The Wolfs Crossing park wasn't even complete at the time of the traffic study and is missing its impact. The park has a lot of activity and already added to considerable traffic in the area including 248th Avenue. The Friday evening traffic for prayers and kids going to parks for start o fthe weekend don't mix at all.
- 5. Even the number of Northbound and southbound cars are around 130+ every 15 minute interval in the submitted traffic study. This will impact the traffic flow on 248th Avenue in general and also the entrance and exits to the residential neighborhoods.
- 6. All the proposed multiple uses make this a very active and constant use site that will have a direct impact on the traffic levels and quality of life in the neighborhood. This will make is a less desirable residential area and reduce home prices. A development should enhance the quality of the existing residents without any negative impact.

7. The grand scale of this project will also attract visitors from out of area and add to traffic. This development is best suited to a location with easy access to highways - this site is in the middle of a residential area with I-88 being 8 miles away.

I ask you and the planning commission to deny the request for this proposed development and **keep this a kid friendly residential area with no major developments that adversely impact the residents ever.** I moved to Naperville and especially this neighborhood for a reason which I believe is same for all the residents of the communities in this area. Lets keep Naperville what it is - One of the best places to live - now and into the future with its happy residents.

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Hello Sara and Ray,

I appreciate your response to my inquiry regarding the future development on 248th Street. Recently, I have spoken with neighbors from my County District in the Tall Grass neighborhood and I personally went onsite to view the development parcel and adjoining lots. There are several safety concerns that I have for our residents in the area. The proposed project will increase density and will no doubt increase traffic throughout the day. Access to the development will cause concerns, especially because the two separate entrances/exits are located on the same road (248th Street).

- Has the City reached out to the Naperville Park District to notify them of the development and received their input regarding the safety of children and residents on the trail located on the north side of the development?
 - o The trail crosses 248th Street and currently does not have any lights or bridge to allow pedestrians and bicycles to cross safely.
 - o The developer should provide an appropriate crossing intersection to ensure the safety of residents who use this trail. Crosswalk signage, a light, or a pedestrian bridge would help to alleviate these concerns.
- Does the city have recent projected traffic numbers regarding this development?
 - Traffic data should reflect the anticipated volume after Illinois lifts the "Restore Illinois" mitigation requirement.
 - Even though our schools are not meeting in person, we still continue to have a large volume of traffic in this area. As the surrounding residential developments complete, they will bring in additional vehicular traffic. This factor also needs consideration.
- Has the city informed and received feedback from the staff at School District 204? The continued residential
 development in the Tall Grass area and this proposed development will impact transportation operations for the
 school district.

The future growth of transportation from the growth in both public and private school families raises a concern that the existing roads are not sufficient to address traffic volume, even with the proposed road improvements. For the proposed uses of a worship center, school, and banquet/community center this will no doubt create more traffic in that area throughout the day and into the evening. Route 59 is a road that is more suitable for that amount of traffic volume. This project will increase traffic on 95th Street, Wolfs Crossing, and 248th Street. Trumpet Lane will also receive additional traffic. Will staff also evaluate the project to determine if it will add any traffic from trucks delivering supplies for the Center or school buses?

Is it possible for staff to provide an opportunity for residents to meet and discuss these issues before the project goes all the way to the Planning and Zoning Commission? It is important that Naperville residents have the opportunity to communicate their comments and concerns. Safety and the quality of our neighborhoods should be the top priority. Residents have concerns of increased noise, congestion, and safety for Park District trail users and local residents and just recently, there was a very serious accident on 248th street.

Thank you for working with me in ensuring the safety for the residents and community at large in District 11. Your efforts to collaborate with Naperville residents is very much appreciated.

Hi Sarah,

I am reaching out to you in regards to your role in reviewing and sponsoring ICN's proposed mosque and lot construction. As a resident of Tall Grass, who regularly utilizes the entrance off of 248th and Landsdown, I am very concerned with two key issues related to the proposal.

First and foremost are the traffic concerns. 248th is a primary route for our residents and students going to work and to and from Waubonsie Valley High School for school, activities and events. It is already a challenging route with the railroad crossings along Keating, 91st and Montgomery and this would add a tremendous burden and risk to that route. ICN claims that adding a left turn lane on 248th will alleviate this but I don't think it will make a dent on the traffic load on a two lane road. The addition of 7-900 cars traversing this route daily for the daily prayers, etc, will add an immense traffic burden for our residents and residents of neighboring communities.

The size of this mosque seems way too large for the property and residential area. It seems better suited to a major highway. (such as Route 59, Route 34, etc). It would even work out better on Wolf's Crossing. I just don't see how having this huge conglomerate at this location is logical.

Secondly, the height of the related structures is incongruent with the residential nature of the area. I'm seeing 52 feet for the building, which is significantly higher than the surrounding homes and 84 feet to the Minaret peak. This is in an area, where there are no other structures and no other tall buildings, without space to add any. It will be very obtrusive to the line of sight for many homes. Can you clarify that these measurements are correct? I have tried to comb through the various zoning requirements on the Naperville website but I have not been able to find actual height restrictions for residential. I'm also wondering if the height restrictions in South Naperville differ from the height restrictions in other residential areas of Naperville.

Thank you for your guidance on this issue.

This is a very big concern for us. We built our home in 2001 and have valued so many things about this area. We love the quiet, residential nature of the area bordering 248th, including the walking path. This experience will also be dramatically disrupted by such a large increase in traffic to the area.

As a long-time resident of the Tall Grass neighborhood, I am writing to express major concerns and plead that this project not be approved in it's current state. The structure itself ("the largest in the Midwest") is not well-suited to the size and location of the land purchased.

At 80ft tall, it would tower over our neighborhood and those recently built around us, even from a distance. That seems very inappropriate for a residential area. I'm trying to think of something on our side streets away from Rt 59, 95th St and 103rd street that isn't residential in nature... I can't think of anything. The new Compass church on Rt 59 and 103rd St seems to be better placed.

Next, the number of intended parking spaces is truly insane! 900?!?!! I can't fathom 900 vehicles traveling in and out of this area all weekend every weekend. Our streets can't tolerate that influx and outflux, nor do we want that level of traffic brought to our section of town. 248th is currently only 2 lanes. Even with expansion, that is a lot of traffic. Many people may opt to short cut the congestion zooming up and down our main streets where speeding is already a problem. In fact, my son's friend was hit by a driver on his bike recently while they were out riding together. We have lived on Tall Grass Drive across from Fry Elementary for 13 years and it is truly a problem already. Additionally, folks may start parking on our streets to avoid the traffic and walking over.

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Hi Sara,

I live in the Tall Grass Community of Naperville and I have been monitoring the updates to the planned construction of 6 phases of ICN right by my neighborhood. Reading through the specifics of the project and the scale of what is planned to be done really concerns me. I want to be clear that I am not opposed to any religious establishment in my neighborhood, but what I am opposing to is the size of what is planned to be done right in the middle of around 9 communities.

It looks like the facility is going to be very large that has around 900 parking spots. This will certainly increase the number of cars that are going to flow through the 248th, 95th, 103rd and also in my community as well. All the roads except 95th are not wide enough to handle this huge influx of traffic. Costco on Rt. 59 and 75th street has around 600 parking spots and we see what that has created.

Here are my concerns:

Traffic safety: Additionally, since our community is behind this facility people coming to ICN will be driving by our neighborhood which will increase traffic in our community and also bring along other safety issues(speeding, reckless driving, etc) in a community that has kids playing and people actively cycling and jogging.

Light pollution: For a structure that is going to have 900 parking spots, there is going to be lot of lights which is going to completely change the nightly atmosphere around this area. I can't imagine the houses by that facility that are going to have lights over their houses and the nights are not going to be the same.

Sound pollution: With the size of the project there is going to be lot of sound generated from this new facility due to the events that occur frequently. I have also seen in communities like Bridgeview where there is a mosque and they play the sound every half hour during the day with a loudspeaker.

Location: The location of the ICN is right in the middle of 9 communities and I am not sure why the city would allow something like that to come up. If we take the case of Calvary church on Rt 59 and 83rd street, I am fine with that as it is on the main road. But this is on a small street sandwitched among residential communities. This is by far my biggest concern. If the same ICN had planned this on Rt 59 or some other major road I wouldn't have any issue with it.

Water run off: Since there are going to 900 parking spots there is going to be water run off issues from this parking lot to our community during rain and snow melt downs. This could potentially create basement leakage issues for residents surrounding the facility.

Property value: I am very concerned that due to the above reasons, the property value in and around this facility will drop. Already residents of my community had gone through so much of house value reduction due to economic down turn, this further reduction will be completely on us for allowing for this to come up.

I am a resident of the Tall Grass neighborhood and wanted to voice my strong objection to the scale of the proposed Islamic Center of Naperville.

As you are probably well aware, the proposed site for the development sits right in the middle of several residential communities, with Tall Grass being the subdivision that is impacted most severely. With the proposed size of the development, planned in multiple phases, the influx of traffic will hamper regular commute for existing communities.

The traffic study by ICN is inadequate. It has not assessed the impact of traffic on days where typical gatherings at ICN will take place. Furthermore, it has not taken into consideration timings of school and the impact it will have on those commutes.

In addition, while the study states that no traffic is expected to pass through the tall grass subdivision, since 95th or 103rd will make it easier to get to the ICN, reality will be much different. Grassmere Road, Lapp Lane as well as Lansdown connect to 248 that run through the tall grass subdivision. At times of heavy traffic, we can certainly see people taking shortcuts to reach the ICN through these roads that run through the subdivision.

In addition to the traffic concerns, I wanted to address the tranquility of the neighborhood, that is bound to get disrupted by the scale of the ICN. A small place of worship certainly does not bring any objection. However, a multiple phase project with multiple buildings and an estimated 900 car parking lot is bound to impact the tranquility and feel of the neighborhood. It is bound to drive property values down in the long term.

The scale of this project is bound to impact the subdivisions that are adjacent to the area as well as the subdivisions right across 95th as well as 103rd.

I request you to consider the detrimental impact of such a large project in the middle of a residential neighborhood and decline approval for a construction of this scale. It is understandable if it is off 59th or other major road, but the site is not conducive to something of this scale.

My family and I are residents of Naperville, specifically in the Ashwood Pointe Subdivision off 248th Ave.

I am originally from England having been born and brought up there but for the past 18 years, since my marriage, I have been a resident of the USA, in and around the Naperville/Aurora area.

The reason for the short background is to voice my very deep concerns over the proposed mosque on 248th Avenue. I grew up in an area of England where there is a large mosque within walking distance of my childhood home and I have seen first hand how an improper infrastructure causes widespread chaos and commotion.

Similar to 248th Avenue, the roads around the mosque near my parents' home are small and not wide enough to handle the large congregations that gather for the prayer times and huge celebrations. The surrounding roads and areas are constantly backed up with traffic, making it unsafe not only for other residents and motorists but also for children crossing the road. In England, there are crossing places (zebra crossings) for people to cross but it depends on motorists driving carefully. There is a small crossing on 248th Ave which motorists rarely stop at now to allow walkers, children, bicyclists etc to cross from one side of the bike path to the other. Even with other routes available to bypass the mosque, residents in the near vicinity have no other alternatives of getting to and from home and are constantly delayed as a result. The situation on 248th Avenue is worse as there is only one way in and out of the proposed mosque causing untold frustrations and delays to existing residents in the neighbouring subdivisions, with Ashwood Pointe obviously being highly affected. This is still an issue near my home in England, as again similar to 248th Ave, there was not much room to widen the road and as traffic and population increases the problem of traffic control becomes more important and significant.

I'm a resident of Ashwood Pointe in Naperville. I read about new development for ICN; I thought the development plans were cancelled couple of year back. Based on public information I came across the land is classified as residential. I am concerned as to why are we allowing this community center in Residential zone? The City of Naperville so far has done good job of separating residential and commercial area. So why are we deviating from this practice?

The ICN wants to develop prayer center, school and banquet space for community event. To my understanding the current land does not have enough space to accommodate parking. This large center will draw large crowd not just from Naperville but also from neighboring cities and towns. I am concern that the patron's parking and traffic will spill over to my community and will start using street parking at or closer to Ashwood Pointe entrance which will cause congestion, nuisance and safety risk for community members.

In addition, the 248th street is single lane (North and South bound each). Most of the time it can take up to 5-10minutes to make left turn north bound to get out of community and left in to community from south bound. Even right turn (South bound) can be pain sometime.

In October the new park opened on Wolf Crossing and 95th street. I have noticed increase in traffic over weekends or when weather is good. With new ICN community center build, additional traffic will make things worse. I am concern that during high congestion, this traffic will start passing through Ashwood Pointe community to beat traffic. This traffic may go over the speed limit that we have around the community street making unsafe.

Hello Sara,

My name is Hitesh Dharamshi and I have been a resident of Naperville for about 12 years. Regarding the ICN plan to build a mosque on 248th Ave, I have concerns that are mostly foundational in nature.

Land is limited so its usage needs careful consideration. I would cast land usage into two broad categories - General Use and Limited Use. Usage of land that serves the purpose of all or most residents, like a park, school, hospital or shopping mall or even new residential subdivision can be termed as General Use. On other hand, usage of land which benefits only a small or limited residents can be termed Limited Use, as in the case of this mosque being planned by ICN.

Limited Use of land needs to be closely monitored because it permanently takes away from all residents the benefits which could have accrued had that land been put to General Use. This does not mean Limited Use has to be prohibited. For a thriving and supportive community, both are required but there has to be balance. This balance comes from a set of criteria, let's call them Social Criteria, which possibly may not be covered by engineering, environmental, pollution, traffic and such other by-laws laid down by the city. Such Social Criteria can be used to judiciously decide on permitting Limited Use of land.

Taking present situation as an example, Social Criteria can be following:

- 1. Number of residents that will benefit from Limited Use, as a proportion of total residents. Perhaps acknowledge that residents of neighboring cities may also benefit from such Limited Use.
- 2. ICN already has three other facilities in Naperville. With the fourth facility being proposed, will any of the present three facilities under Limited Use revert back to General Use?
- 3. Let's say reasonable driving distance is 15 miles, arbitrarily. Within a 15 mile radius from the proposed facility, how many other such facilities are present?

This is not an exhaustive list, but thoughts in this direction can guide City Management in deciding, hypothetically speaking, if there is ever a proposal for fifth facility by ICN in future. I would like to know if City Management has discussed such Social Criteria; if not, perhaps consider including these.

To be fair and clear, the intention is not to single out this specific proposal but that Social Criteria should apply for all such Limited Use and evolve for betterment of all communities residing in the city.

I am a resident of South Naperville and this email is regarding the proposed multi phased construction of a building or set of buildings for religious use in the empty patch of land on 248th Ave between 95th street and 103rd street.

I live in the Tall Grass subdivision and I have multiple concerns regarding the proposed construction that I would like to bring to your notice for consideration by the Naperville district (esp. the Planning and Zoning Commission)

- I understand that the area is zoned residential and a construction of this size, scale and magnitude is ill suited for the zoning category, surrounding area, capacity of the roads in front of it and the size of land (900 parking spots and so many buildings in this space?). Its akin to having a Costco within a subdivision!
- The most immediate concern is obviously the traffic increase brought on by the construction both during the construction phase as well as during the operational phase. 248th Ave is but a two lane road. I fail to see how it can handle this volume of traffic going forward. It already handles traffic relating to 6+ subdivisions (Tamarack Fairways/West/South, Ashwood Pointe, Ashwood Park, Ashwood Crossing, Tall Grass and Pencrosse Knolls), 1 elementary school (Peterson) and miscellaneous traffic using Wolf's Crossing and Normantown roads to get to Aurora and Oswego.
- 248th Ave traffic largely feeds into 95th street. 95th street additionally handles traffic from the Wolf Crossing Community Park (which has about 300 parking spaces, I estimate, if not more), 3 + subdivisions (Carillion Club, Emerson Park, Heather Stone) and the traffic from the commercial and residential establishments (reflections Drive, Naperville Crossings,95th street community plaza, etc.) around the 95th-rt 59 light.
- The kids from this area attend WVHS and extra traffic of this volume in this area will greatly impact the travel times to and from school for each and every student and parent, everyday. And many kids go back and forth multiple times a day to school to participate in after school activities. The rail road crossing magnifies the effect of even small increases in traffic loads along Normantown road in both direction.

The traffic as seen in the last few month are no indicator of typical loads and many offices and schools are operating remote during the pandemic. Some of this traffic will divert into Rt 59 increasing the loads further on 103rd st and its intersection at rt59 where a new subdivision and church have just come up. Apart from this are the differing individual impacts this has on property prices at Tall Grass and surrounding areas – it has already been observed that houses that border this land are not selling even after repeated attempts over several years, decimating retirement plans of its owners.

Thank you for acknowledging the concerns of the Naperville residents in this matter.

My name is Sumit Ray; I am a registered professional engineer and resident of Tallgrass sub-division in Naperville.

Recently I came to know about the ICN project (248th Ave) through our HOA and I did review the project information as it is available at city's website. This parcel is currently zoned for R1 (low density residential house). This is a 13.6 acre lot and ICN is asking approval for —

- 1. R1 Conditional use (exhibit-1) for Religious use
- 2. Zoning variance (exhibit-7)

Here are my concerns:

- 1. Intent of the conditional use permit
 - a. Proposed plan (Master site plan drawing) include
 - i. Mosque = 25,219 ft2
 - ii. Conference Hall = 22,814 ft2
 - iii. School = 41,249 ft2
 - iv. Gym = 26,852 ft2

Total area proposed = 89,282 ft2 and <u>religious activity only 28%</u> of the area. This is difficult to consider as a religious facility and <u>doesn't meet</u> the requirement of the "conditional use" permit. The variance is NOT in harmony with the general purpose and intent of this title.

2. Height Requirement under conditional use

6-6A-8: - HEIGHT LIMITATIONS/BULK REGULATIONS:

The maximum height for all buildings and structures in the R1A district shall be two and one-half (2½) stories not to exceed thirty-five (35) feet.

The proposed ICN building height exceeds this limitation (see Building elevation)

3. ICN Response to the standard

3. The variance, if granted, will not alter the essential character of the neighborhood and will not be a substantial detriment to adjacent property.

The variance, if granted, will not alter the essential character of the neighborhood and will not be a substantial detriment to the adjacent property. To the contrary, the variance will be appealing, tasteful and will have a positive effect to the character of the neighborhood. The proposed parking will be designed, laid out, and constructed, in a manner that achieves both balance and harmony with the neighborhood, and blends in a visually unobtrusive manner with the surrounding area.

This proposed mega structure middle of the purely residential area will never blend with the neighborhood and have big visual impact. This building will standout and ruin the atmosphere of the surrounding residents. It will be like having a "Costco" or "Walmart" middle of the residential neighborhood. This area will lose its charm and serenity. The proposed size of the establishment is not a neighborhood religious place of worship, this will be "tourist" destination as the plan calls for largest Mosque in the Midwest.

4. Water retention basin

- a. It is 662 ft long and 6ft deep. This body of standing water is not desirable next to the residential houses (no buffer). Concern is insects, odor & mosquito etc.
- b. The overflow water will be discharged in the pathway (green) towards tallgrass which is not acceptable.

5. Traffic issues

The existing 248th Avenue (only road access for ICN) is designated as "248th Avenue is a north-south, minor arterial roadway". Here is the definition —

FC 16/ Urban Minor Arterial:

Interconnects with and augments the urban principal arterial system and provides service to trips of moderate length at somewhat lower of travel mobility than principal arterials. Ideally, they should not penetrate identifiable neighborhoods. The spacing of minor arterial streets should normally be not more than 1 mile in fully developed areas.

As it is designed for lower volume of traffic and already under evaluation to make it 2-lane road to handle the expansion of the neighborhood. There are (4) new sub-divisions are developed in this area.

With ICN, the traffic will substantially increase which will call for 3-lane road for which no room is available for further expansion.

<u>Traffic Study</u> – The KLOA traffic study is NOT acceptable. They used only 1-day in January for the entire determination of all traffic situation (on peak, off peak, weekend etc.). Also it doesn't include actual current residential load. This study is paid by ICN which is also not acceptable. There should be independent traffic study based on actual traffic load. More detailed study is required to estimate traffic impact for next 30-50 years.

The published ICN operating plan includes – prayers (5) times each day including peak office hours; school traffic and related ICN activities. Also they expect 1000 people for the prayer. This will create traffic deadlock. This is NOT acceptable in the residential area.

<u>Entrances</u> – ICN has right-in / right-out entrance which will create huge traffic roadblock from the traffic coming from the North side as there is no traffic light. This is NOT acceptable. Other similar religious places in Naperville – All church and other religious establishment in Naperville (there are 8 such Churches) are located at the intersection of two major intersections and away from residential neighborhoods.

<u>Out of Town traffic</u> – It's ICN intention to make this center largest in the Midwest. This will be kind of tourist attraction and will draw people from other towns – Traffic from I-88, I-355 and Route 59 will be impacted as well. All traffic will come thru 95th st, 103rd st and finally 248th Ave. This will create bottleneck.

6. Noise issues

The city has noise ordinance to maintain <u>55 db at the property line</u>. ICN has to study the noise and provide evidence that they will meet city's noise ordinance at any time of its operation.

7. Light issues

The light level of 0 fc at the property line. Photometric study has to be done to provide evidence that light pollution will not impact neighbors at any time of its operation.

8. Emergency Issues

Naperville has a goal for response from time of the call to arrival is to arrive within six (6) minutes. This is critical to save life. This ICN establishment will increase traffic and will impact the emergency vehicle to response on time. This traffic is NOT acceptable.

9. False Information

ICN is presenting –

ICN DESIGN MEETS ALL ZONING OR BUILDING CODE REQUIREMENTS – NO VARIANCES!

This is not true. They are asking for zoning variance as stated in Exhibit-7.

10. Suggestions

- a. Keep it R1 zoning (no conditional use permit issues to any party)
- Only developers to build residential neighborhood (ICN members are welcome to build houses)
- c. ICN should look for alternate location for this project. This is a right project but wrong location
- d. Alternate location for ICN could be in the Fox valley Mall area which already has large car parking area and part of the mall can be converted for ICN operations.

Dear Ms. Kopinski,

We are residents of Carillon Club and are opposed to the planned Islamic Center of Naperville planned for 248th Avenue between 95th Street and 103rd Street. Carillon Club is a 55 plus community for active seniors. We are senior citizens who experience unique driving needs as we age. Our reflexes, eyesight and hearing are not as good as when we were younger, even though we can easily pass a driver's test. There are over 750 units in Carillon Club and most, if not all units have a driver from that residence. Many residents of our community share our new age-related adjustments to driving.

A few months ago we attended a zoom meeting presented by the City of Naperville on the planned future expansion of 248th Avenue. During this meeting we learned of the Islamic Center site. Overhead street lighting and traffic control lights were discussed. We brought attention to the needs of senior citizens for adequate overhead street lighting, especially considering the increased vehicular traffic from the Islamic Center. The response we received from the Naperville representatives indicated that streetlighting and traffic control lights were not part of the budget. Additionally, since the pedestrian/bike path is adjacent to the planned Islamic Center, questions about an overpass or underpass at this site were raised by multiple participants. Again, the response was that it was not in the budget.

As noted, this is an entirely residential neighborhood. Many older churches and

synagogues in Chicago and the suburbs were built in residential neighborhoods when most church goers attended services on foot. For the most part, newer churches, synagogues, and mosques are built in non-residential areas or on large thoroughfares with traffic control, and easy access to the parking lots. The following churches are examples of newer houses of worship on large church campuses with ample parking, easy access, and large wide streets that do not encroach on residential locations: Holy Spirit Catholic Church, 2003 Hassert Boulevard, Calvary Pentecostal Church, 9S200 Route 59, and Zion Lutheran Church S, 1107 Book Road. All of these are in Naperville, Illinois. These churches have large setbacks from the street, are on divided highways with parkways in the center, and have ample room on the grounds for vehicle parking and staging while waiting to exit onto the street.

The congestion caused by this planned Islamic Center in a residential neighborhood would be extreme. This is especially true when considering the added traffic from the recently built Wolf's Crossing Park which attracts families and children and poses safety issues.

There are two 55 plus active adult communities within a few blocks of the proposed Islamic Center, Carillon Club with over 750 units and Ashwood Crossing with over 100 units. Safety on 248th Avenue is an issue for seniors adjusting to the new challenges of aging when driving on this street now, without the added traffic of the proposed Islamic Center. The fact that this Center is intended to be the largest in the Midwest it may attract larger crowds than a traditional house of worship.

It does not appear that the site can accommodate the planned mosque, parking, school and future expansion, and manage the traffic demands on this small road even when widened. 248th Avenue has little space for widening, especially since not all of 248th Avenue between 95th and 103rd is slated to be widened.

We can appreciate the need for this Islamic Center, especially since our family has members who practice Islam. We believe a larger site in a non-residential neighborhood with a wider more accessible street would be more appropriate. The safety and congestion concerns about the site and scope of this Islamic Center would cause great hardship on the community and neighborhood. My husband and I strongly oppose the choice of this site for this exceptionally large project.



DID YOU KNOW?

The Islamic Center of Naperville (ICN) is requesting permission to build a religious institution in a residentially zoned area; the open lot on 248th Ave between 95th St and 103rd St. They intend to build a mosque starting in Spring of 2021 (see pictures below). Construction of additional buildings is planned in five (5) phases (K-5 school, multi-purpose hall, gymnasium, and subsequent expansion of the mosque) over the next thirty (30) years.



Key aspects of the proposal are:

- ICN is requesting a conditional use permit to construct the mosque and other facilities
- · ICN is requesting two (2) variances to reduce the front yard setback and not construct a buffer fence
- No approvals for development or construction have yet been issued by the City as of yet
- The ICN intends for this facility to be the largest in the Midwest
- · 901 parking slots are proposed to be built
- The proposed height of the structure is 80 ft
- The site, located in a residential area surrounded only by residential communities (Ashwood Park, Ashwood Creek, Ashwood Heights, Ashwood Pointe, Carillon Club, Penncross Knolls, Tallgrass, Tamarack West, and Tamarack South) in its Immediate vicinity, as well as the recent park on Wolf's Crossing and Trumpet Ln.

- The matter is set to be presented at the Planning & Zoning Commission meeting January 204.

Dear Ms Kopinski and other City officials involved with the subject project:

I am a resident of Naperville. I live in the Tall Grass subdivision adjacent to the site of the proposed project. My purpose in writing is to express my concerns with this development.

The subject location is currently zoned for residential use. This zoning designation is consistent with the surrounding area. The site is located in an area that has predominantly single-family homes on all sides. The project as proposed is inconsistent with the local use and the currently established zoning.

The proposed structure's appearance is out of character for the area. The height of the structure is proposed at eighty feet. That would make it materially taller than any home in the surrounding area. It will most definitely result in a material degradation of the line of sight views of the nearby homeowners on all sides. The general style of the proposed structure is also inconsistent with the style of the residences in the area. Instead of blending into the location, this would completely distort the location's character.

The proposal includes having as many as 900 parking spaces. That by itself says that this is not intended to be a neighborhood center. It is instead expected by the developers to attract substantial usage from afar. Again, this demonstrates that this location is inappropriate for such a development.

Following that point, the proposed high usage would necessarily cause significant increases in vehicular traffic on nearby roads. These would include 95th Street which is a multi-lane road. However, the increased traffic would also occur on 248th Avenue and 103rd Street, which currently have only one lane in each direction. And, even worse, it would likely result in significantly increased vehicular traffic on local roads through the adjacent subdivisions as patrons of the proposed center find ways to avoid traffic congestion on major arteries. These local roads include Landsdown Avenue, Tall Grass Drive and Rollingridge Road; all in residential areas with many children.

Finally, I believe that this project is inconsistent with the City of Naperville's own published Community Plans. Those documented plans, published on Naperville's own website, emphasize that developments should be consistent with neighborhood use, emphasize esthetics consistent with the area and should minimize traffic conflicts with the surrounding uses.

Given the distortion of the character of the local community, this project would result in reduced property values of the many homes in the surrounding area. The benefits of the center would accrue only to the patrons of the center who, because of the large parking facilities, are expected to be substantially coming from outside the local area.

I ask that those who will determine whether this project should be approved or not to ask themselves an additional question.... Would I want this development adjacent to my place of residence?

As a final observation, the Islamic Center of Naperville has two other nearby locations. One is on Ogden just east of Route 59; the other is on 75th Street east of Washington. Each of those properties appear to be developed much more cohesively with their surrounding areas including the streets which they border. I suggest those could used as examples of developments that are consistent with Naperville's standards.

My wife and I returned to Naperville, after having lived in several other locations around the country, because we felt that Naperville was a well-planned community where businesses, schools, churches and other uses were integrated in a harmonious way thus having synergistic gains for all. I know that consideration of new development must weigh the potential of increased revenues, social goods and other economic gains against the negatives that may be brought. I cannot see how the net of those, in this case at this location, yields an overall benefit to Naperville's residents.

I am a resident of the Tall Grass community. My husband and I retired back to Naperville five years ago after having moved around the country due to job relocations for 18 years. Our first home was in Naperville and we knew we wanted to come back to the area. We chose Tall Grass because of the community feel, walking paths and close proximity to every day shopping.

I was a real estate broker and Realtor for 14 years in the Denver metro area prior to retiring. As a real estate professional for all those years I have had the vast first- hand experience in knowing what drives a community like Tall Grass. I also know that the proposed Islamic Center of Naperville development would pose a drastic negative impact on the value of not just the homes in the immediate perimeter of the center but the entire Tall Grass community and surrounding subdivisions. If this center was here prior to our home purchase I can tell you we would not have considered Tall Grass.

The parcel of property that is being proposed for the Islamic Center is zoned residential for a reason. It is more in line with the entire area. The magnitude of the project is simply inconsistent with the entire surrounding residential neighborhoods and poses a severe disservice to the residents if approved. Yet another major concern is the traffic that this project would be drawing to the area. The capacity of the roads simply cannot handle this level of vehicles. Also, a major concern is knowing that there would be many vehicles taking shortcuts thru Tall Grass – Tall Grass Drive, Landsdown and Rollingridge just to name a few. We are a community with many children, people walking their dogs, joggers and cyclists in addition to an Elementary school and Middle school.

All in all, I feel there are more than enough serious negative reasons that this Islamic Center not be approved. There are so many other empty spaces, entire vacant shopping areas that are far more appropriate for this type of facility. They already have large parking lots to accommodate what is being proposed.

If approved I would seriously consider moving. We have put so many beautiful upgrades into our home and landscaping to maintain the value of our property

I am writing to you regarding the proposed project on 248th avenue by the Islamic Center of Naperville.

These are the key aspects of my understanding and concerns:

- 1. The R1 zoning permits religious structures in addition to homes and recreational facilities
- 2. 248th avenue is the only proposed entrance and exit for the proposed site
- 3. The plan, as submitted, will have 719 parking spaces, as well as 182 parking spaces in a land embankment, indicating that a total of 901 parking spaces are planned for
- 4. All development surrounding the proposed site is residential homes, trails, and now a park
- 5. The organization expects that most of the people visiting the facilities in question will come from outside Naperville, since the immediate neighborhoods do not have as many followers of the Islamic faith.
- 6. This will mean that all access routes, mainly Rt 59, will carry all this traffic into and out of this area
- 7. On the incoming traffic, vehicles coming in from Rt 59 must come through 95th st and go south on 248th ave, or 103 st or other streets further south, and then north on 248th ave.
- 8. While incoming traffic may be somewhat dispersed, the outgoing traffic after prayers will definitely be in a large burst. We can all see the number of cars and the police intervention needed at the Calvary church, which is situated on cross roads and still generates traffic congestion. We can also see the mass of people crossing Ogden on foot, a lot of them without following traffic signals, for Friday prayers at the Islamic center located on Ogden and Rt 59

All of us here in Naperville, whether born in the USA, or having immigrated here from around the world, prize our country and its citizenship. Many of us like me came here to avoid or escape bigotry and hatred based on race, skin color, and religion, among other things. Therefore I am more than supportive of our muslim brothers and sisters having their own place of worship or cultural activities. I wouldn't want any less for myself.

That said, I strongly object to the location of said proposal. It poses a clear problem for the traffic, crowding, and congestion in the immediate area. Especially on Fridays, there will be games at Nequa; kids will be coming back from school, and imagine 901 cars trying to get out through 248th ave and then on to north or south Rt 59. This is also true of kids coming home from Waubonsie via Keating and Normantown. Especially, all the school buses are parked on Normantown. Add to that the backups due to railroad crossings a few times during the day.

I also understand from my research that property values tend to go down in such scenarios. Especially when a section one's subdivision will have a large dome for it's skyline (based on my understanding that the mosque's dome will be 80 ft high).

This will be uncharacteristic of a residential area that we know of. Even within the Tallgrass subdivision (as I am sure of other subdivisions too), there are restrictions on how high your structures can be, the material and style of construction, etc. While all of these restrictions are meant to preserve property values, the construction of this center in question will break all the rules that my HOA has enforced upon me and everyone else in my subdivision for all these years. Which begs the question, why should we even have these rules in place?

Which means that if the project is allowed to progress, I and many others must flee the area before things spiral down. This is not what we want for us and our kids.

I would also like to ask the city as to what the economics are for this proposal. How much will the city need to spend to accommodate the project? And what does the city expect to receive back on its investment?

There are many strip malls in Naperville that are lying vacant due to not just the pandemic, but also due to the changing nature of business worldwide. If the ICN folks could acquire one of these large sites, such as the erstwhile Sam's club on Rt59 (I understand it has been bought by the owners of India Mall), and build their facility there, it would not only help with traffic issues as the site would be serviced by at least one major road, but 900 cars coming in could generate a lot of business for the city, such as gas stations, grocery stores (Naperville attracts a lot of Indian grocery shoppers from around), restaurants, and such. We could step up Naperville as a social and economic hub.



The Tall Grass Homeowners Association ("TGHOA") is a non-for-profit corporation duly incorporated under the laws of the State of Illinois consisting of 1080 homeowners and townhome residents. Located within the corporate limits of the City of Naperville, Tall Grass Subdivision ("Tall Grass") is bounded by IL Route 59 to the east, 95th Street to the north, 248th Avenue to the west and 103rd Street to the south. The TGHOA is charged with ensuring that the Tall Grass Subdivision remains a safe, attractive and harmonious residential development with continuing appeal to enhance and preserve property values and to provide for a residential community of the highest quality and character for the residents of Tall Grass and the City of Naperville ("City"). In furtherance of that mission and for the safety and protection of Tall Grass and all Naperville residents, the TGHOA requests the City of Naperville deny the request for a conditional use permit and variance to the front yard setback for the proposed development submitted by the Islamic Center of Naperville ("Petitioner") for the project located at 3540 248th Avenue because the proposed development fails to meet the criteria necessary for City approval.

The Petitioner has proposed to construct a five-phase development on a 13.63-acre site consisting of a school, mosque, multi-purpose hall, and gymnasium to be constructed over the next 30 years (the "*Project*"). The site is currently zoned R1 (low density single-family residence district) and was approved by the City for annexation in December 2011. Section 6-6L-3.5 of the City's municipal code provides that a religious institution *may* be permitted in a R1 zoning district in specific situations in accordance with the procedures outlined in Section 6-3-8 and Chapter 4 of the City's municipal code. The Petitioner is seeking conditional use approval for the Project as well as a variance reducing the front yard setback from 30 feet to 20 feet. For the following reasons as more fully explained below, the Project fails to meet the standards for approval of the proposed conditional use and request for variance and both petitions should be denied.

THE PROJECT FAILS TO MEET THE STANDARDS FOR CONDITIONAL USE APPROVAL

Pursuant to Section 6-3-8.2 of City's municipal code, the planning and zoning commission shall not recommend, nor the city council grant a conditional use in a particular zoning district or districts unless it shall make findings based upon the evidence presented to it in each specific case that:

- 2.1. The establishment, maintenance or operation of the conditional use will not be detrimental to, or endanger the public health, safety and general welfare; and
- 2.2. The conditional use will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other property in the immediate area for the purposes already permitted, nor substantially diminish and impair property values within the neighborhood;
- 2.3. The establishment of the conditional use will not impede the normal and orderly development and improvement of the adjacent property for uses permitted in the district.
- 2.4. The establishment of the conditional use is not in conflict with the adopted comprehensive master plan.

The establishment and operation of the Project as proposed will be detrimental to the safety and general welfare of Tall Grass and the residents of Naperville because the scale of the proposed parking, building footprints and overall impervious area for the Project far exceeds that of other similarly situated religious institutions in southwest Naperville which will result in increased traffic, noise, light pollution that is not compatible with the surrounding residential use. Table 1 below summarizes site data for other similarly situated religious institutions in Southwest Naperville. Table 1 highlights the drastic differences between the Petitioner's request and previously approved projects illustrating how the proposed conditional use is detrimental and not compatible with the surrounding residential neighborhoods.

As shown above, the Project is more closely akin to the Costco located along IL 59 and 75th Street than to a religious institution nestled into an existing mature residential neighborhood. The proposed plan seeks nearly 200 more parking spaces than the existing Costco site.

The traffic study submitted by the Petitioner highlights additional safety concerns. First, the Project proposes two full access drives within 390 feet of each other. This type of access is usually reserved for sites located on corner lots abutting major roadways. All sites in Table 1 are located on corner lots except for the Petitioner's (proposing two full access points) and the Jesus

Christ of Latter-Day Saint facility (which only has one full access point and one right-in/right-out access). Only 662 feet of frontage exists along 248th Avenue and the requested two full access points result in the need to reduce the left turn lane and/or taper along 248th Avenue by approximately 50 feet as the end of the left turn lane taper will encroach on the location of the north access drive. Also, to accommodate the increased traffic for the southbound left turn lane into the north access drive for the Project, the study recommends the relocation of the Tall Grass Greenway bike path crossing at 248th Avenue; however, no alternatives are proposed. The traffic study notes the City may be exploring alternatives in a Phase I study. Altering the existing bike path will be injurious to the use and enjoyment of the general public and other property in the immediate area for that purpose which is already permitted.

Finally, the traffic study indicates a traffic signal is likely warranted at 248th Avenue and the south access entrance into the Project. The traffic study fails to discuss the impacts of cut through traffic through Tall Grass along Landsdown Avenue, the potential for Tall Grass Drive at the Tall Grass Greenway to be used as offsite parking and the effect of newly opened Wolf's Crossing Community Park on average daily traffic projections. Lastly, it is believed that the City is undertaking a traffic noise analysis along 248th Avenue in which this Project will certainly have a detrimental effect. Taken together, these factors are a significant detriment to the existing neighborhoods and do not warrant the approval of a conditional use permit for the Project. Simply put, the Project is too large for the existing parcel and its impacts too detrimental to the surrounding neighborhoods for the City to recommend approval.

THE PROJECT FAILS TO MEET THE STANDARDS FOR APPROVAL OF A VARIANCE REDUCING THE FRONT YARD SETBACK FROM 30' TO 20'

Pursuant to Section 6-3-6. of City's municipal code, The City Council, after receiving a report from the Planning and Zoning Commission containing its findings and recommendations, may vary the regulations of this Title if it finds that the variance requested is in harmony with their general purpose and intent and complies with all of the standards for variances established herein. The City Council shall not vary the provisions of this Title concerning permitted uses, conditional uses or the regulation of nonconforming uses. Any recommendation by the Planning and Zoning Commission and any decision by the City Council shall be predicated on evidence and finding that:

- 2.1. The variance is in harmony with the general purpose and intent of this Title and the adopted comprehensive master plan; and
- 2.2. Strict enforcement of this Title would result in practical difficulties or impose exceptional hardships due to special and unusual conditions which are not generally found on other properties in the same zoning district; and
- 2.3. The variance, if granted, will not alter the essential character of the neighborhood and will not be a substantial detriment to adjacent property.

With respect to meeting the standards required to grant the requested variance of reducing the front yard setback from 30 feet to 20 feet, the Petitioner fails on all counts. First, the variance is **NOT** in harmony with the general purpose and intent of the zoning title and the adopted comprehensive master plan. The purpose and intent of the City's zoning ordinance is to improve

and protect the public health, safety, comfort, convenience and general welfare of the people by preventing the overcrowding of land, to avoid the inappropriate development of lands and facilitate the provision of open space (See Section 6-1-2 of City's municipal code). In this request, the Petitioner seeks only to increase the onsite area of land for additional development. Reducing the front yard setback allows for an additional 10 feet of paving to encroach into an already over paved and over parked lot. Granting a variance to allow more parking spaces only overcrowds the land and reduces the existing open space which is in direct contravention of the intent and general purpose of the zoning title.

Second, strict enforcement of the zoning title does **NOT** result in any practical difficulties or impose *exceptional* hardships due to special and unusual conditions which are not generally found on other properties in the same zoning district. There is nothing exceptional, special or unusual about the existing parcel. Petitioner submits that the Project is located in close proximity to Tall Grass and that by reducing the setback creates additional buffering. The proximity exists along the south property line, not the east line. The existing buffer along the east property line without the proposed variance is currently over 200 feet. An additional 10 feet along the east property line effectively adds no additional buffer and only serves to increase the number of parking spaces. The variance that should be sought is to move the Project 10 feet north, doubling the existing buffer to the south to 20 feet, where Tall Grass residents are just 10 feet from the proposed parking lot.

Finally, granting the variance WILL alter the essential character of the neighborhood and WILL be a substantial detriment to adjacent property in that: (i) it will reduce the amount of open space on the site; (ii) add parking spaces and impervious areas to an already over parked site and most importantly; (iii) it will move the entire site 10 feet closer to the 248th Avenue roadway reducing the amount of open space in 248th Avenue parkway creating a potential safety issue for the motoring public along 248th Avenue as illustrated below:

The previous picture was taken on Monday April 20, 2012 at 248th Avenue and Lapp Lane (just 570 feet north of the Petitioner's Project) after a school bus was involved in an accident with a sport utility vehicle. The school bus came to rest approximately 55 feet from the existing 248th Avenue edge of pavement. As proposed, the Petitioner's current variance would place the parking lot approximately 50 feet from the existing pavement. Had the accident above occurred in front of the Petitioner's site, the school bus would have been in the parking lot. Compounding the safety issue, once 248th Avenue is widened, the existing roadway will be that much closer to the proposed parking lot. For all the foregoing reasons, most importantly the safety and welfare of the general public, the Petitioner's request for a variance to the front yard setback to allow additional parking spaces should be denied.

In 2011 when the Project was before the City for annexation, representatives from the TGHOA requested the City include "hard constraints" tied to the annexation that would govern the development of the property to protect the existing residents and address their concerns. (See attached Exhibit A - Chicago Tribune Article dated 12/21/2011). At the hearing, the City deferred the issue of imposing any conditions on the Project stating that the Petitioner would be required to return to the City for conditional use approvals. Councilmen said it made more sense to review development constraints at that time of the conditional use request. Nine years later, that time is now. Counsel for the Petitioner stated at the annexation hearing that the Petitioner would listen to the residents' concerns and provide "special protections" to create a buffer between the property and its closest homeowners. Unfortunately, those representations that the City relied on to approve the annexation have not occurred. In fact, the opposite has occurred. The plan as proposed and the variance requested seek to remove the existing protections already granted under the City's municipal code.

Attached to this letter as Exhibit B is an additional list of concerns that the TGHOA would like City Staff to review and address before making any recommendations about the future of the Project. The TGHOA is not opposed to development; however, it will not support development that would be detrimental and unsafe to Tall Grass and the residents of Naperville. The TGHOA is available to discuss any of the previous concerns; however, at this time as the Project has been presented and on behalf of the residents of Tall Grass, the TGHOA respectfully requests that the City deny the conditional use permit and deny the requested variance to the front yard setback to allow additional parking spaces.

Naperville to annex land meant for mosque

aperville officials agreed to annex land owned by the Islamic Center of Naperville, capping several months of resistance among neighbors of the parcel in the southwest part of the suburb.

Representatives of the religious group say the 14 acres along 248th Avenue between 95th and 103rd streets, could be home to a mosque in five to 20 years.

For now, the Islamic Center plans to use a house on the property — formerly owned by HOPE United Church of Christ — as a residence and office and may occasionally hold small prayer gatherings there.

For several months, the proposed annexation has generated protests by residents in the nearby Tall Grass and Penncross Knolls subdivisions who have said they are worried about issues like noise, traffic and parking once the mosque is built.

Islamic Center attorney Len Monson told the City Council the organization will meet all regulations, share plans with nearby neighborhoods before taking them to the city, listen to residents' concerns and provide "special protections" to create a buffer between the property and its closest homeowners.

"We will work diligently to protect our contiguous neighbors through landscaping, berming, trees, stormwater, parking location, whatever way we can," Monson said.

Representatives of Tall Grass said some residents still are leery and asked to see some of the protections Monson referred to appear in the annexation agreement.

"All we're asking for is on behalf of residents of Tall Grass is to ... be able to have some hard constraints the petitioner would have to abide by moving forward," resident Jeremy Sentman said.

However, councilmen said doing so would not make sense without knowing more about the future building, which would require city approval.

EXHIBIT B

Tall Grass Homeowners Association Concerns Regarding ICN Submission

Construction/Development Plans Sub-Committee Questions:

- 1. Require ICN to adjust site plan to move hardscape and buildings north (possible zero setback line along the north line) and approving the front yard setback variance request from 30' to 20'. This increases the buffer along the existing Tall Grass residential homes.
- 2. Construct berms around the existing site including moving the detention pond 15' to the west. This move would allow sufficient room to build a 4' high berm.
- 3. Install 8' high privacy fence on top of the berm. This would build a buffer screen 12' high.
- 4. Provide a submittal of the fence to the TG HOA and require cut sheets and color photos to be included with approvals and permits.
- 5. Delete the single row of parking spaces (53) along the south perimeter of the property.
- 6. Build the lost parking deleted from the south to the 'future' parking west of the detention basin. This would add back 104 parking spaces. The single row of 'future' parking spaces adjacent to the detention basin would be deleted due to the space required to build the berm on the east side of the detention basin.
- 7. As part of Phase 1 Construction:
 - a. Build storm sewer lines with catch basins and connect to green way main.
 - b. Install berm and fence on east and south as described.
 - c. Excavate and build the detention basin. Show phasing for the pond.
 - d. Install all site perimeter landscaping along the south, east and north property lines.
- 8. Provide a construction schedule with a completion date for Phase 1 site work. Storm sewer, detention basin, berm, fence, landscaping, parking, etc.
- 9. Do not allow dirt/topsoil to be stock piled on site after Phase 1 is complete. Otherwise, provide grading and soil erosion control plan including seeding and silt fence details and timing.
- 10. Provide a land use plan detailing how the balance of the site will be used and maintained before construction of Phases 2, 3, 4 & 5.
- 11. Landscape plant sizes and quantities need to be increased. Buffering along south and east lines adjacent to the existing residential houses is insufficient.
- 12. Concerns about the pitch of detention basin and standing water, insect control and odor.
- 13. Need latest ICN resubmittals to the City of Naperville.
- 14. Need Staff's proposed comments and recommendations to Planning and Zoning and review comments from the City to ICN with responses for the site plan submittals (ICN currently on 3rd submittal).
- 15. How does the City's 248 street road improvement scheduled to start in 2024 impact ICNs traffic study.
- 16. Request a reduction in minuet and dome heights to proposed buildings.
- 17. Restrict access along the north property line due to offsite parking issues. (See Item #15 under traffic).
- 18. Install fence/increased landscaping along north property line.
- 19. Provide detail on required site parking per code (square footage and basement area).
- 20. The need and timeline for Additional Parking area between the detention pond and easterly phase line needs to be addressed/removed. (See Note #5 above).

Traffic/Safety Impact Sub-Committee Questions:

- 1. The existing traffic study is incomplete and inadequate. Revise the existing study to account for new developments and park sites in the surrounding neighborhoods and increase the study areas to account for cut through traffic through the Tall Grass Subdivision.
- 2. How does the City of Naperville evaluate the traffic impacts on surrounding community when evaluating a project like ICN?
- 3. First Student buses are stored on Normantown Road. How does the City prioritize the flow of bus traffic? Are considerations made for delays of bus schedules and their ability to serve the community.
- 4. Does the City communicate with the School District to get input on a project of this magnitude? There are 6 schools (Fry Elementary, Scullen Middle School, Crone Middle School, Peterson Elementary, Neuqua Valley HS, Waubonsie Valley HS) that may experience transportation challenges.
- 5. 248th Avenue is used by high school students who attend both Neuqua Valley and Waubonsie Valley High Schools. Does the City consider the experience levels of drivers when making determination on projects?
- 6. 248th Avenue expansion project is not scheduled to begin until 2024. Is the community expected to deal with the adverse impact of increased traffic resulting from ICN until project completed? The widening of 248th Ave is expected to take 12 months, is there consideration given to timing of project and impact of ICN on 248th Avenue?
- 7. KLOA's study of existing traffic flows were conducted on Monday, January 14, 2019. Since the study was conducted there have been approximately 250 plus homes built between the buildout of Ashwood Park, Ashwood Point and Ashwood Crossing and the City of Naperville opened Wolf's Crossing Community Park (33 acres of team sport fields, fitness and exercise trails).
- 8. How does the City account for the safety of pedestrian and bicycle traffic generated by the Tall Grass Greenway Trail? The study does not account for this traffic.
- 9. Crash data used in study was from 2014-2018. Is there more current data from IDOT or City of Naperville?
- 10. What does the City consider a significant disruption to the levels of service in traffic flows?
- 11. Does the City evaluate the impacts on Rt 59 differently than 248th? How is 248th classified by the City?
- 12. How does the City measure/quantify impact on residential community's traffic flow?
- 13. The use of traffic control officers on Friday afternoons will help ICN traffic exit onto 248th Avenue. What will the City of Naperville do to mitigate the adverse impact of traffic through surrounding neighborhoods?
- 14. The KLOA Report concludes that the level of service at 248th Avenue and Lapp Lane and 248th Avenue and Landsdown Avenue is projected to operate LOS D where the volume-to capacity ratio is high and either progression is ineffective or cycle length is too long. Many vehicles stop and individual cycle failures are noticeable. Does the City of Naperville find this level acceptable?
- 15. Address off street parking issues. Will Tall Grass Drive be utilized as a de facto parking lot with increased pedestrian traffic?
- 16. Restrict north access to a right in right out only.

We, the undersigned South Naperville Residents, are opposed to the approval of a conditional use permit and their request for a variance regarding the Islamic Center of Naperville's 248th Avenue Project as it has been submitted to the City of Naperville. The current plans and permit submission fail to adequately address the safety and other developmental concerns raised by the community surrounding the proposed development.

Our concerns are many, but not limited to the following:

- Residents of South Naperville do not believe the 248th Avenue project meets the standards for a conditional use ICN is requesting. Due to the large-scale design of the 248th Avenue Project in relation to the plot of land annexed, residents from the South Naperville area have submitted numerous concerns on the construction/development plans of this project and how the proposed design will negatively impact existing homes within the subdivision.
- We are greatly concerned about the Traffic/Safety impact and implications this project will have on the South Naperville subdivisions. These concerns are not limited to the construction phases, but also include concerns after the project has been completed. The residents from the South Naperville area have submitted numerous questions outlining these concerns and the negative impact this project will have on Traffic/Safety in our community.

We petition that the Planning and Zoning Commission of Naperville and the Naperville City Council deny the Islamic Center of Naperville's conditional use permit, their request for variance and their proposed site plans to build the 248th Avenue Project based on the current submission.

Dear Ms. Kopinski and Planning & Zoning Commissioners:

I appreciate the critical roles the City Planning Team and the Planning and Zoning Commission (PZC) play in policy development and zoning decisions consistent with the City's planning documents and state statues. Your work requires extensive outreach to develop plans and policies that align with the public's vision, goals, and objectives and has cemented Naperville's national recognition as a place to live, work, and play. The City's Master Plan guides land use and community planning decisions. I believe that ICN's Conditional Use request for a mixed-use, mega-project in a Residential Neighborhood does not align with the City's Land Use Master Plan.

We are discussing the Conditional Use request for this small property because decisions have been continuously kicked down the road. When the 2002 Southwest Community Area Plan was completed, this property was outside of the study limits. The 2002 Plan does not show any detail for a specific use. When this property was annexed in 2011, discussions focused on annexation only and the public was generally silenced and told they would have input into land use decisions and conditional use decisions at a later date. (see 2011 annexation minutes). As you know, owner intent does not equate to land use or zoning approvals. It is the City planning documents and policy that guide approvals.

Eighteen years after the 2002 Southwest Community Area Plan, the City has appropriately updated plans and policies to guide decisions to 2040. The Southwest Community witnessed tremendous growth in the last two decades and I commend the City for updating the plans, policy, and vision in accordance with existing land use and traffic conditions as well as community input.

So, for the decision that has been put off until the appropriate time, does ICN's Conditional Use request for a campus in a Residential Neighborhood align with the City's Draft 2020 Land Use Master Plan (Master Plan)? I firmly believe their wish to operate a regional facility in a low density Residential Neighborhood does not align with City land use or mobility plans and offer the following – note that all quoted material is directly from the Master Plan.

The stated goals of Naperville's Land Use Master Plan are to "serve as the single-reference tool for future land use planning in the City, provide recommendations that are reflective of the City's vision, as well as best practices, trends, goals, and opportunities related to sound land use planning and provide clear, concise, and focused land use recommendations based on professional planning expertise and community input. As such, the Master Plan should be referenced daily as the consolidated policy guide for land use decisions made by City staff, City Council, Planning and Zoning Commission, and other boards and commissions. It should be used to assist with policy formation, prospective projects, development proposals, and planning initiatives to ensure that future decisions are in line with the City's set goals."

The Master Plan designates each area of the City as a place type or designation. "This approach promotes a sustainable and livable land use pattern, taking into consideration compatibility, flexibility,

access, market viability, sense of place, and the daily delivery of essential and desirable goods and services. The Land Use Plan identifies the character of each area in Naperville with the intent of fostering distinct places within the context of the City's existing development pattern. Details regarding parcel-specific land use should be determined on a case-by-case basis by using the Land Use Master Plan's policies and recommendations to evaluate the appropriateness and desirability of potential development. This takes into consideration the desired character, mobility, urban form, and design of properties and how those all contribute to make a unique and desirable place." The decision at hand, should a Conditional Use be granted for a 900-parking spot facility with mixed-uses planned for 7 days a week in a Residential Neighborhood? Does this proposed facility fit within the character of a Residential Neighborhood, bordered by a bike trail, and does it reflect the character, mobility and sense of place? Does it reflect the existing development pattern and design of properties?

The Land Use Master Plan identifies six distinct place types in Naperville. It is important to note that the Master Plan further defines design and mobility expectations for each of these six place types. These expectations should also be considered for decision making. These six place types include:

- 1. Residential Neighborhood
- 2. Neighborhood Center
- 3. Urban Center
- 4. Regional Center
- 5. City Corridor
- 6. Employment Center

Most of Naperville's Residential Neighborhoods are low intensity and served by quiet local streets. The multiple neighborhoods surrounding ICN's property are served by local streets constrained by railroad tracks and dead-end streets. Contrary to the Master Plan goals and objectives, and community themes developed during your city-wide outreach, allowing a conditional use for a 900 parking spot facility does not promote a sustainable and livable land use pattern. In fact, a quick read of ICN's Strategic Plan informs one that their campus is intended to generate revenue via rental space and they plan to consolidate facilities once this campus is constructed. One needs to look no further than their activity calendars at other, smaller facilities to understand the mixed-use, traffic generating expectations from morning to evening 7 days a week. Also, a quick Yelp review informs me that their existing Naperville facility draws attendance from throughout the Midwest and there is considerable traffic congestion after events. This does not align with the City or residents' vision, goals or objectives of Residential Neighborhoods. Nor does it align with the key themes and vision developed by hundreds of Naperville residents during your outreach.

The comprehensive Master Plan covers land use compatibility of adjacent areas. For Residential Neighborhoods, the Master Plan notes that "property values, safety, and overall quality-of-life can be affected by the adverse impacts of adjacent nonresidential activities, and encroachment by incompatible land uses." The Master Plans states that "place types accommodating high intensity uses and activity, such as Employment Centers and Regional Centers should ideally be separated from Residential Neighborhoods." ICN's high-intensity use and activity fit best in place types such as Urban Centers, Regional Centers or City Corridors where traffic impacts can be mitigated and their Conditional Use for a campus in a low density residential area should be denied.
